The Colonial Records.

A few days since a resolution was introduced into the senate requesting the secretary of state to furnish each member with a copy of the colonial records gotten up by the late Col. W. L. Saunders.

This resolution was voted down and Senator Sherill has submitted the following as a substitute.

Resolved by the senate, the House of Representatives concurring, that the secretary of state be and he is directed to furnish the University, and each college (male and female) each high school, each graded school, each orphanage, where there is a library, the soldiers' home, asylums or hospitals, and also other public libraries disconnected from colleges or schools, one set each of the colonial records of North Carolina; provided, that parties receiving such records shall pay the freight on the same.

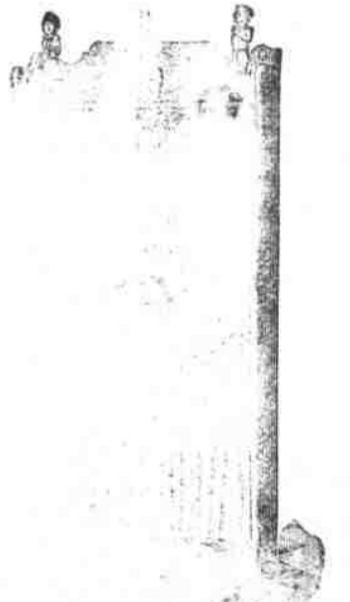
