

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

SENATE.

February 14, 1893.
The senate was called to order at 10:30 o'clock by Lieut. Governor Doughton. Prayer by Rev. Mr. Barker of Brooklyn church. Reading of journals dispensed with. The following bills were introduced

To incorporate the Columbia, Charlotte and Winston Railroad. Relative to the crime of rape and assault with intent to commit rape. The following bills passed:
To allow the town of Edenton to build a market house passed 3d reading.

To allow Richmond county to sell their poor house and issue bonds passed 3d reading.

To incorporate Pendleton in Northampton county, passed 3d reading

To incorporate the town of Bostick in Rutherford county, passed 2d reading.

To incorporate the Roaring Gap resort company in Alleghany county passed 3d reading

The bill for an appropriation of \$40,000 annually to the Deaf and Dumb Asylum at Morganton was made the special order for next Tuesday night.

To incorporate the Mt. Pleasant Manufacturing Co., passed 3d reading

To allow the governor to appoint judges to hold courts in case of sickness passed its 3d reading.

HOUSE.

Speaker Overman called the House to order and Rev. Mr. Rowe prayed.

The chief bills introduced were as follows:
To abolish the office of county superintendent and county board of education

To incorporate the Exchange Bank of Winston.

To incorporate the Charlotte, Troy and Sanford railway.

To give the mayor of Raleigh concurrent power with magistrates and allow police officers to serve warrants

To provide for working on the public roads of prisoners sentenced by magistrates.

To reduce the fees of register of deeds for recording lien bonds from 80 to 50 cents.

To declare the diplomas of the Peabody Normal School equal to a state certificate for teachers.

To require the listing of all solvent credits for taxation.

To incorporate the Durham and Charlotte railway.

To allow the authorities of any county, city or town who have failed to list property to enter all property so omitted.

The bill to amend the homestead was taken up and discussed ably for two hours by Messrs. Kitchen, Watson of Forsyth and Harris. It was put to a vote and failed to pass, ayes 38, noes 77.

Bills were tabled to abolish the homestead, and to reduce it to \$500
