**Important Suit.**  
A most important suit is in progress at Rockingham court. It is a suit for \$10,000 damages brought by a brakeman of the Roanoke and Southern Railroad for injuries while in discharge of his duties. It will settle a question as to whether railroads are liable for accidents to their employees.
