It is now thought that the matter of taxes between the state and the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad is in a fair way of settlement.

The seance of Prof Eddy at Metropolitan hall last night was mysterious in the extreme and astonished all present. Some of the demonstrations are beyond all explanations.

Will a quorum be present at 12 o'clock Saturday, March 4th, when the legislature adjourns? If all the members go to the inaugural who think about it, we very much doubt it.

Rev. J. L. Foster will be in the country tomorrow morning so there will be no preaching at 11 a. m. at the Christian church, but at 7:30 p. m. the regular service will be held.

It is a source of much gratification to learn that our two female institutions—St. Mary's and Peace Institute—are in a most flourishing condition. There are no better schools in the south.

The fare from Raleigh to New Berne on the occasion of the fish, game and oyster fair, which commences next Monday, will be \$3.53. Tickets are now on sale by A. S. Lewter, agent at this place.

The bill to incorporate a railroad from Durham to Charlotte, was opposed in the senate yesterday by Senator Aycock on the grounds that it would be injurious to the interest of the state in the North Carolina Railroad.

North Carolina is falling into line with her sister states of the great American Union. Nearly all of these have grand monuments to perpetuate the memory of their gallant dead. She has just provided a suitable monument on the battlefield of Guilford court house. She will not refuse a like memorial to the Confederate dead?

A personal encounter took place in the Senate chamber this morning just prior to the meeting of the body, between Senator Day and Mr. Joseph Daniels. We did not exactly get at the gist of the difficulty. Mr. Day struck Mr. Daniels, but no further blows passed, as the parties were separated. Telegraph Tolls.

The State Railway Commission has issued an order that whenever a message is sent over two or more telegraph lines owned and controlled and operated by separate and distinct corporations or individuals the joint rate shall not exceed 40 cents for such message of ten body words between any two points within the limits of this state, nor more than 8 cents for each additional word.

How to Direct and Mail Letters

Mail matter should be addressed legibly and completely, giving the name of the postoffice, and, if to a city having a free delivery, the street and number, and the postoffice box of the person addressed should be added, if he have one. It is well to give the county also, and to spell the name of the state in full. To secure return to the sender in case of misdirection or insufficient payment of postage, his name should be written or printed upon the upper left hand corner of all mail matter. The matter will then be returned to sender, if not called for at its destination without going to the Dead Letter office, and, if a letter, it will be returned free.
