

THE GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

SENATE.

February 23, 1893.

The senate was called to order at 10:30 o'clock by Lieut. Governor Doughton. Prayer by Rev. Dr. Reid.

Reading of journals dispensed with. The following bills were introduced: To incorporate the Farmers Mutual Fire Association of North Carolina. To amend the Pharmacy laws of N. C.

The bill to provide for the support of the Normal school of Greensboro, was reconsidered and widely discussed. It passed its 3d reading being a reconsideration of the bill heretofore passed. It reduces the appropriation from \$15,000 to \$13,500 per annum.

The bill making an appropriation for repairs at the State University, &c., passed its 2d reading.

HOUSE.

Speaker Overman called the House to order at 10:30 o'clock. Prayer by Rev. Dr. F. L. Reid.

The following important bills were taken up and put upon their several readings:

Mr. Allen, of Wayne, stated to the house that the senate refused to concur in the house amendments to the bill to amend the charter of the Wilmington and Weldon railroad and require them to pay back taxes, &c., and moved that the house recede from its position. After considerable debate by several of the members, the house receded from its position and the bill passed and was ordered enrolled for ratification.

The house then took up the banking law, it being the bill of Mr. Watson, of Forsyth and adopted by the committee. The bill passed 3d reading and passed on the calendar.

Special order called at 12 o'clock it being the bill for the support of Insane Asylums of the state, postponed till tomorrow morning 10:30 o'clock.

The house adjourned to meet at 7 o'clock tonight.

BURNED TO DEATH.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Feb. 20.—The Birmingham Mill burned today. There was a small fire yesterday, which it was supposed had been put out, but it blazed up again today, and was under too great headway to be extinguished.

Two car-loads of flour and several thousand bushels of meal were destroyed. The total loss is about \$80,000. No insurance. The mill belonged to Comer & Wilkinson.

J. A. Lewis, superintendent, was asleep in the building, and was burned to death.

THE AUSTRALIAN SYSTEM FOR ALABAMA.

MONTGOMERY, Ala., Feb. 20.—Last night the senate passed the Sayer election bill. It had already passed the house. The governor will sign it, and then it will become a law of the state. The new election law provides the Australian ballot. Its effect will be to disfranchise illiterate negro voters to the number of about 40,000 or more in Alabama. The penalties for the violation of the section governing registration and voting are very rapid. The new law will go into effect with the next general election. The Kolb, or third party Populists, in both houses were against the bill all the way through. They had been clamoring for a new and fair election law for two years past, and when this one was offered them they opposed it directly. The bill makes everlasting Democratic rule in Alabama.
