CITY IN BRIEF.

Full moon today at 10 o'clock a. m. Lots of folks going to the inauguration.

The election of justices of the peace will take place tonight.

The machinery bill comes up in the Senate tonight as a special order.

There is a general rush to Washington City, from different parts of the state.

Mrs M H O'Neal is very sick at her residence, corner of Davie and Person streets.

Shad are coming in freely, but there is very little abatement in price. Most too high for the average purse.

Mr J. Q. West, of Washington City, who has been visiting friends in Raleigh, returned home yesterday.

One of our carpenters told us this morning that there was a great deal of building in prospect for Raleigh this spring.

Mr. A. Dughi has received an order from a distance for 60 gallons of ice cream and 150 pounds of cakes. This speaks well for Raleigh.

There was a long debate in the Senate today on the machinery bill, especially on the feature relative to taxation of solvent credits.

Thus far the cotton seed oil mill in this city has crushed, this season 6,500 tons of seed against 6,130 the whole of last season.

Both houses of the general assembly were in session until a late hour last night. The galleries were crowded with the beauty of the city.

The rush for office continues unabated. Every day in the senate and House of Representatives, petitions for signatures are circulated among the members.

The sudden rise in the sidewalk on Hillsboro street, just west of the railroad bridge, is a regular trap to the pedestrian, especially when the nights are dark.

The bill for the Agricultural and Mechanical college appropriates \$10,000 a year and gives \$2,500 annually for 1893 and 1894 for the purchase of 18 acres of land near the college.

Our State Guard.

We very much hope that the movement to cut down the appropriation to our State Guard will not prevail and that this noble band of patriotic citizen soldiery will long continue the efficient pride of our state. We know that there is a wide spread notion that because we are in the midst of profound peace, there is really no use for an appropriation to keep the guard on a high grade. This is not the proper view of the matter, in our opinion. The old adage, that "in time of peace prepare for war," comes in with much force just here. We all know that we live in variable times. In fact in this age it is almost impossible one day to foretell what may happen the next. While North Carolina enjoys the enviable reputation of being one of the most peaceable commonwealths in the union, yet an emergency may arise that would require the putting forth of the strong military arm.

As we understand it, the present appropriation is a very moderate one, inferior to that in most of the states for similar purposes, and to cut this down now is indeed bad policy. We hope the law may be allowed to stand as it is.

A Catholic bishop resident of New York passing through Raleigh last Friday sent the ladies \$5 for the Confederate monument fund, and spoke in strong terms of admiration for their enthusiasm and the patriotism of the Legislature.

The Raleigh water works company are taking up the supply pipe which now runs under the Careleigh mills, for several hundred yards. This will prevent any further trouble in the matter.

Mr. B. R. Lacy was appointed today by the governor as commissioner of Labor Statistics. He was confirmed in executive session by the senate this afternoon.

The insurance bill passed its final reading. It gives the Secretary of State complete jurisdiction of insurance companies, and also prescribes a standard form of fire insurance policy. It does not prescribe forms of life insurance policies.
