The senate last night passed the bill to provide for the maintenance of the militia and state guard. It had previously been tabled.

The report of the auditor of North Carolina shows that there are 153,477 white polls and 63,081 colored polls returned as having paid, the proportion being about 22 to 10. The property of the whites yielded \$984,012 and that of the blacks \$12,373, the proportion being about 80 to 1. The last Legislature made an effort to tax incomes, but the income tax yields only \$1471.
