CITY IN BRIEF.

The cold wave is widespread. Winter lingering in the lap of spring.

Mayor Baizer is confined to his home with sickness.

This unseasonably weather has been a serious set back to business today.

The new librarian Mr. Ellington, will, we learn take charge of the office on the 1st of April.

T. R. Jernigan, Esq., editor of the Chronicle has returned from a trip to Washington, D. C.

The matter of a new station house will soon come up. It is a city institution badly needed.

Judge Walter Clark has been elected an honorary member of the Guilford Battle Ground Association.

There is no doubt that Hon. F. M. Simmons will be the next collector of Internal Revenue for this district.

A gentlemen today said it was noticeable that St. Patrick's day was almost invariably cold or inclement.

Mr. Jernigan, editor of the Chronicle, says there are about 67,000 office seekers in Washington by actual count.

The general assembly, at its recent session passed an act providing for another assistant surgeon for the N. C. State Guard.

Mr. Frank Strouch and other members of the penitentiary board are engaged today in taking an inventory at the institution.

The cloudy weather prevented frost last night and it is hoped that the fruit in this section may yet be all right, although many trees are in full bloom.

Journalistic changes and consolidation are much talked of on the streets, but we know of nothing in the way of confirmation sufficiently authentic to give to the public.

If Vice President Stevenson can be induced to deliver the address at the 4th of July celebration of Guilford Battle Ground Association, it will make it an occasion of much joy.

There are some important improvements going on at the Soldiers' Home the \$3,000 being used in the construction of a dining room and dormitory. There will be about eighty inmates very soon.

It is now estimated that the total amount of appropriations made by the last General Assembly was \$90,000. The financial capacity of the State Treasurer, Mr. Tate, is equal to the occasion.

Brookside Park now presents the appearance of a "deserted village." As the spring and summer will soon be upon us, it might be well to look after it at once. It is too pretty a place to be allowed to languish.

The Greensboro Record says: Misses Maggie Busbee, Mildred Badger, Maddie Marshall and Margaret Hinesdale, a bevy of Raleigh's fair young daughters, were here this morning en route to Worthville to pay a visit to Mrs. Hal M. Worth.

It is expected that work on the extension of the street railway from the Hillsboro road to Pullen Park will soon be commenced. The route will be from a point just at the entrance to the grounds of the Agricultural College, crossing the North Carolina railroad with a bridge on the cut dividing the park from the college grounds.

John Young, a colored man, who was sent to the penitentiary for seven years, attempted to escape from the chain gang at Carthage last Wednesday. He was shot by the guard and instantly killed. He had served four years of his time, and the worst feature of the affair was that his pardon had been granted and was on its way to the authorities.

Statement.

Col. Paul F. Faison of the retiring management of the penitentiary has rendered a statement for the quarter ending February 28th, 1893. The total expenses were \$35,500.55. The earnings for the same period were \$10,195.40.

No Action.

The new management held another meeting at the penitentiary, yesterday, but, aside from perfecting the organization of the board and some routine business, nothing of public importance was done. It was concluded advisable to postpone for awhile the selection of minor officials, there being a great number of applicants. In the meantime Superintendent Tazear will give the institution his entire time making himself familiar with the surroundings. It will probably be a week or so before another meeting will be held.

A New Station House.

It seems to be generally understood that of the \$500,000 in bonds to be issued by the city \$300,000 is to be used on the streets. The balance as we understand it, can be used at the discretion of the board of aldermen for improvements. We know of no better way in which the surplus can be utilized than by the erection of a suitable station house for the incarceration of offenders against the municipal ordinances. The present excuse for a station house is a disgrace to the city and is what may be termed a "man trap." To incarcerate a man in such a place no matter for what offense, is to cause a risk of his life. We hope that the board may see their way clear to establish a new station at the earliest moment.

Bound Over.

This afternoon Esquire C. B. Root who is acting in place of Mayor Badger temporarily, bound over to the next term of the Superior Court, in the sum of \$15, Mr. Ellridge Smith for an assault with a deadly weapon. The evidence was gathered as follows: Yesterday afternoon during the alarm of fire, as Mr. Smith and a man named Ghoman were passing along Martin street, they met with an Italian who asked them where the fire was. They gave him an evasive answer and mocked the Italian in his language. This provoked the man and he called Smith a very obnoxious name. Smith then struck him with a rock. The Italian followed him a short distance, when Smith again struck him with an ax handle. The Squire held that the weight of evidence is strongly against Smith and hence the bond for the use of a deadly weapon. Counsel for Smith insists that the Italian should also be sent on to court, but Squire Root holds his decision in abeyance.
