## CITY IN BRIEF.

As the prospects are now most excellent for a fine fruit crop, somebody will be regretting that they have not started a canning factory in this vicinity.

We are much pleased to hear that there will be no removal of the work shops of the R & G Railroad, but that they will be operated in this city as heretofore.

The clay soil on the sidewalk on the north side of Hargett between Wilmington and Blount streets, is anything but pleasant on rainy days. A coating of gravel would help out.

It is rumored that Rev Janus Horner, of the Horner school at Oxford, will succeed Prof Eben Alexander in the faculty of the university of North Carolina. The selection would be a most admirable one in all respects.

Our venerable friend, Mr W C Upchurch, told us today that he did not remember to have seen such a protracted cool spell in April. He is nearly 80 years old and been a resident of Raleigh a great many years.

New cotton factories are in sight at Raleigh, Charlotte, Concord, Rockingham and Haw River. North Carolina is fast losing its name as an agricultural state and is entering the ranks of a great manufacturing commonwealth.

Many wild rumors may be expected as to the real condition of affairs at James City. Our Governor is present and we may rest assured that no steps will be taken without due consideration. He will however, be firm and insist that the majesty of the law must be vindicated.

## All Quiet.

There has been no material change in the status of affairs at James City so far as can be ascertained, at this writing. It is confidently expected that there will be a peaceful solution of the matter. There have been no reports of unusual disturbances on the part of the negroes, and it is more than probable that the civil authorities can manage to carry out the mandates of the court. The presence of the military has however had a most salutary effect.

This afternoon a dispatch was received from Maj Harrell, now at James City, stating that Gov Carr had a consultation with representatives of the colored tenants at that place at which the governor gave them until 8 o'clock this afternoon to decide what course they would pursue. This being the case, further intelligence will be looked for with much interest.

## Capt. J. E. Pogue.

The votes given him last night, therefore, were entirely of a gratuitous character, which under the circumstances were a just tribute to his past services. We can state without charge of invidious distinction, that he has made a most excellent representative of the city's interest, and upon all opportune occasions was one of the advance guard in every movement for the material progress of Raleigh.

## Mad Dogs.

In view of the fact that there is some excitement in the country about mad dogs, we give the law upon the subject, as follows:

"When the owner of any dog shall know, or have good reason to believe that his dog, or any dog belonging to any person under his control has been bitten by a mad dog, and shall neglect or refuse immediately to kill the same, he shall forfeit and pay the sum of \$50 to him who will sue therefor; and the offender shall be liable to pay all damages which may be sustained by any one, in his property or person, by the bite of any dog belonging as aforesaid, and shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and fined not more than \$50, or imprisoned not more than 30 days."
