Lynching.

The law passed by the last legislature against lynching is very stringent. It is as follows:
Every person conspiring to break in jail, with intent to kill or injure prisoners, and every person engaged in breaking in, is guilty of felony; fine not less than \$500 and imprisonment two to fifteen years; duty of solicitor to investigate all such offences; witness failing to attend or answer guilty of misdemeanor; Superior Court in any county adjoining the one in which the offence was committed to have jurisdiction; no witness to be excused from answering any question but to be pardoned of the offence; expense to be paid by county in which offence occurred; sheriff to have guard in case of anticipated danger; county to be responsible to personal representative of any prisoner killed by reason of failure to have guards.
