FLASHES FROM THE WIRES

Very heavy rains prevail in Texas. The Oak Ridge base ball team defeated Trinity College last Saturday by a score of 10 to 1.

The Hartfielders plain mill at Savannah, Ga., was burned last Saturday. Loss heavy.

A syndicate has been formed at Saratoga, N. Y., with a capital of \$4,000,000, for the construction and equipment of a line between Niagara Falls and Albany for the transmission of electric power generated by the Niagara Falls Power Company with the waters of Niagara river passing through wheel pits into a tunnel, which has just been completed. The tunnel is 8,000 feet in length and 24 feet in diameter.

All bicyclers, whether belonging to the clubs or not or allied to any organization of wheelmen will have a day at the World's fair. Under arrangements made by the authorities for this demonstration every wheelman will be permitted to participate in the day's celebration. This will include riders of both sexes and those from abroad as well as local detached members. In fact it will be a sort of field day, open to all, and promises to be a most enjoyable one.

DEATH OF COL. THOMAS.

Charlotte News.

News is given of the death of Col W H Thomas, father in law of Associate Justice Avery, of the Supreme Court. Col Thomas was for years the chief of the eastern band of Cherokees in North Carolina, and raised a "legion" of those Indians for the Confederate service. Col. Thomas was 84 years of age and was a man of much information and had held several prominent public positions. He died in the Western Hospital at Morganton.

JURIES MUST MAKE AWARDS

The foreign commissioners representing France, Germany, Austria, Spain, England and the minor countries have served notice on the World's Fair authorities that they will withdraw their exhibits entirely from competition unless awards were made by juries and not by a single judge.

COINCIDENCES IN THE DEATH OF TWO BROTHERS.

William Rhoades, living near Manchester, York county, Pa., while walking on the railroad track was run over and killed by a freight train. His brother Eli, aged sixty eight years, was killed at the same place just two weeks ago at the same time of day, and by a train in charge of the same trainmen.

DYNAMITE FOR PROHIBITIONISTS.

The residences of three prominent citizens of Mascot, Iowa, who are prosecuting saloon cases were blown up by dynamite. No fatalities resulted, but the houses were completely wrecked. One of the houses destroyed was the home of John Mahon, who is the editor of the Mascot Journal, postmaster, and an ardent prohibitionist.

HARRIS' LAST LETTER TO HIS FATHER.

The last letter written by Carlyle W. Harris to his father, Charles L. Harris, of Syracuse, N. Y., bears date Sing Sing Prison 4 few days before his execution.

"My poor Dear Father: Your letter has come to me. They were too strong for us dad, and we can only be brave and silent now. Be strong and cheer poor mother all you can. Let her never want for love and tenderness.

Your affectionate son, CARLYLE."

The reconciliation between Mr. and Mrs. Harris is said to have been effected at Sing Sing.

POOR PROSPECTS FOR ENGLAND'S HARVEST.

The drought of the last eight weeks has caused a great loss of farm and market products in the South of England. Grain vegetables and fruit crops are withering throughout wide strips of country. A plague of caterpillars is destroying the leaves, blossoms and small fruit in the apple and pear orchards. In Hampshire, Devonshire and Cornwall streams and wells are drying up, and the springs are running low.

THE WHOLE TOWN HAS SCARLET FEVER.

There was almost a riot at Doud's, Iowa, over the scarlet fever quarantine. Frank Hilyer, the hotel keeper, declared his family was not affected, although the Board of Health had so decreed, and refused to be quarantined. The board threatened to use force, and the scarlet fever sign floats over the hotel. Every family in town is afflicted.

The American Sugar Refining Company is said to be behind this increase. It is reported to have bought the entire sugar crop of Cuba so that even the Cuban refineries will not have enough sugarcane to run their mills.
