CITY IN BRIEF.

Mr. and Mrs. Hal M. Worth are in the city.

Mr. Josephus Daniels has returned to Washington City.

The 20th of May (next Saturday) will be celebrated in handsome style in Charlotte.

Over a thousand persons went from Durham to a baptizing near that place last Sunday.

We learn that Mr. W. B. Hutchings, the new city collector, will enter on his duties June 1st, next.

Prof. C. D. McIver, president of the Normal and Industrial School, was in the city yesterday afternoon.

There will undoubtedly be a large attendance here on the 30th, to witness the Jefferson Davis ceremonies.

Mr. and Mrs. A. M. McPheeters and daughter, Mrs. Samuel Inman, left this morning for Baltimore, Md.

It seems to be the settled opinion that Col. Buck Blackwell is the coming man for postmaster at Durham.

Now, that the iron has arrived the connecting line of the electric road with Pullen Park will be rapidly pushed.

Memorial badges designed by J. C. Miller, of Richmond, containing a portrait of Jefferson Davis, have been prepared.

There were eight convicts received at the penitentiary today—one from Lenoir, three from Washington and four from Cleveland.

An election will take place June 20th, in Winston, to decide about the city issuing bonds to the amount of \$150,000 for water works.
