CITY IN BRIEF.

Mr. W G Hill residing three miles northwest of Raleigh died this morning. He leaves a wife and seven children.

Dental Association.

This body has about completed its session, and many of the members will leave the city this afternoon. Today has been to some extent passed in the examination and, in some cases practical operation of improvements incidental to the profession. The session has been productive of much good result to the profession of dental surgery.

Insects.

The North Carolina experiment station has a fine collection of insects but desires further to obtain specimens of every species of insects found in this and neighboring states. Specimens are solicited from school teachers, pupils and others, as well as from farmers and gardeners. Insects sent will be reported free of charge. It is best to send insects and caterpillars alive in small tin or pasteboard boxes which should be well wrapped. Ventilation is not needed. It will be best to tell what plants are fed upon by the insects sent. To those who will collect insects a pamphlet giving full directions for capturing and preparing specimens, will be supplied.

Complimentary.

Our friend Mr. P Linehan informs a reporter of the Washington Star that the specimens of granite and sandstone now on exhibition at Chicago, are a part of the exhibit furnished by him at the exposition held at Raleigh some time ago. Mr. Linehan naturally feels complimented that North Carolina surpasses every state and country in her exhibit of building stones.

New Corporation.

The clerk of the Superior Court this morning, issued letters of incorporation to the Mechanics and Investors Union, with the chief office in this city, with the privilege of branch office in the different cities and towns of the state. The objects of the association are the reception of deposits, to loan and advance money on real estate liens. The authorized capital stock is not less than \$10,000 or more than \$1,000,000 divided into shares of \$100 each. It will be managed by a board of directors of not less than five or more than ten. The following are the incorporators: J C Drewry, J S Wynne, J N Holding, W S Primrose, C G Latta, Geo. Allen, E G Harrell and B S Jerman.
