CITY IN BRIEF.

Neuse river is reported as rising. The creeks in the county are much swollen today. It just poured down yesterday afternoon. See advertisement of cottage for rent by Mrs M A Rogers. The 91st session of Salem Female Institute closed last Thursday. Many of our people will go up to Chapel Hill next week. No news in any of the departments at the capitol today. Lots of people in the city today, but trade nothing extra. The days will soon be as long as they get. The weather today has been unusually hot and oppressive. All accounts agree that the outlook for the fruit crop is excellent. We deeply regret to learn that Mr. Miles Goodwin is still very ill at his residence on West Jones street. Rev. Dr. Eugene Daniel will preach the baccalaureate sermon at Davidson College tomorrow. There will be the regular services at the Soldiers' Home at 4 o'clock tomorrow afternoon.
