CITY IN BRIEF.

The widower's club is the correct thing just now.

Summer travel on the railroads is daily increasing.

The mountain and seashore resorts are rapidly filling up.

The teachers world's fair party will leave for Chicago, July 27th.

Independence Day went off yesterday, in the most quiet manner possible.

Judge Walter Clarke returned to the city this morning from Greensboro.

The board of aldermen will meet in regular monthly session next Friday night.

The internal revenue collections at the Durham stamp office for June were \$52,876.53.

Over \$280,000 pounds of tobacco was shipped last week by the Blackwell factory at Durham.

Merchants should remember that July is one of the months in which to give in their purchases.

The Marine Hospital at New Berne which has been conducted by the sisters of mercy, has been given up by them.

The street cars made regular runs to Pullen Park yesterday. During the day the patronage of the lines was very heavy.

The hopes of the people of Durham for a rock crusher have been crushed. The justices say they are not ready to invest.

Gov. Carr returned to the city, from Greensboro this afternoon. Private Secretary Telfair expects to visit the western part of the state.

Commissioner Laey, of the bureau of labor statistics is sending out inquiry blanks. The object is to ascertain wages paid to farm laborers.

Vitrified pavements are now all the go. We hope to see them adopted on all occasions. They are certainly the most durable and neatest.

Still a large number of persons have failed to list their taxes. The books will be kept open until the 10th of July. Don't fail to come up; if not you may regret it.

A leading merchant of Greensboro told us yesterday that he had no doubt the Battle Ground celebration was worth at least \$15,000 to the town. This is a sensible view and a correct one.

The many friends of Judge Schenck throughout North Carolina will regret to learn that he is not in robust health. He was however so much improved yesterday as to take active part in the Battle Ground celebration.

The new railroad starting from Burgaw, which was first understood to be simply a short insignificant affair, is to be a long connection passing through New Berne and Washington to other points. Four or five hundred hands are at work upon it.

Now that Judge Schenck and his noble coadjutors have set the ball in motion, let the legislature of North Carolina come to the rescue and do something handsome in the way of an appropriation. The sacred spot should be the patriotic Mecca to which all true North Carolinians can turn.
