CITY IN BRIEF.

The summer is fast waning. All quiet in department circles today. A trifle cooler but still very depressing. Mr Hal W Ayer, is rusticated at Morehead. Mrs M J Bellamy, who has been quite sick, is improving. The First National Bank, of Winston, will resume in a few days. Several of our citizens will leave next week for the Columbian exposition. Rev J B Bobbitt, wife and son left this morning for Surry county, N C, on a trip of recreation. All the talk now is the August races. They promise to be very interesting and exciting. A colored exodus is again talked of for the coming fall. It is being agitated to a considerable extent in Winston. Eat sparingly and be careful what you eat. This is the only way to get through the heated term without sickness. Mr C B Holladay, son of Mr A Q Holladay, has accepted a position at the Greenbrier White Sulphur Springs, Va. The visiting Odd Fellows under the chaperonage of Mr Tonoffski and others enjoyed themselves yesterday afternoon on making a delightful trip to Pullen Park. Dr Branson left on this afternoon's train for Durham to attend the 24th session of the Local Ministers Conference. Dr Abernethy, the President of the Conference will deliver the opening address at 8 p.m. Dr Branson has been the Secretary for 24 years in succession. Auditor Furman says that the pension fund for this year will be a little over \$100,000. He says there will be a good many new pensioners, the applications being more numerous than expected. The amount to be paid each class is not yet known as there will have to be an entirely new apportionment. The space in the capitol square fronting the south gate would be an admirable site for the Confederate monument, but then it would obstruct the view of Washington's statue. However, this should be removed to the rotunda of the building where it properly belongs, especially as the old gentleman has no hat on. We briefly alluded yesterday to the proposed road from Rolesville to Wake Forest. We saw a gentleman today from that section of the county who confirmed the report of the early building of the road, and said that much good was expected of it. He declares that an outlet for the farmers there would be worth thousands of dollars in an individual sense, and that the increased value of lands along the line would be apparent. We much regret our inability to be present at the recent meeting of the Board of Aldermen. We are aware of the fact that these meetings should be reported fully, and we propose hereafter to be present, if possible, at meetings of importance. In the meantime we would mildly suggest that it would not be out of place for some of the aldermen to prompt us as to anything of importance. It is alike to their interest and that of the public. Information is desired of William Mabe who left the state farm at Halifax some time since with the intention of going to Greensboro. Since that time nothing has been heard of him. He had considerable money with him, and his friends fear he has been foully dealt with. He is 30 years old, dark complexion, heavy build. His distressed father, John Mabe, at Elk Creek, N C, would be thankful for any news concerning him.

On Tuesday last in House Creek Township, Grover Edwards, child of Mr and Mrs J F Edwards.
Mr Hancock, a young man who, up to the time of the commencement of his sickness, some three weeks since, was telegraph operator at the N C Depot, in this city, died last night at his home in New Bern. He was a gentleman of much popularity.
