November Weather for Raleigh

The following is from the record of observations for the month of November, taken at this station for a period of six years:

TEMPERATURS.

Mean or normal tempera are, 50°.

The warmest Nov was that of 1890, with an average of 51°

The coldest Nov was that of 1887, with an average of 47°

The highest temperature during any Nov was 80° on the 13th, 1889 The lowest temperature during any Nov was 17° on the 30th, 1891. Average date on which first "killing" frost occurred (in autumn), October 20th.

PRECIPITATION (rain and melted snow).

Average for the month, 2.30 inches. Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 10

The greatest monthly precipitation was 3.71 inches in 1891. The least monthly precipitation was 0.06 inches in 1890.

The greatest a nount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 1.62 inches on the 28th and 29th, 1891. The greatest amount of snowfall recorded

in 24 consecutive hours (recorded extending to winter of 1884-5 only) was 2 00 inches on November 29th, 1891.

CLOUDS AND WEATHER. Average number of clear days, 13. Average number of partly cloudy days, 8. Average number of cloudy days, 9.

WIND. The prevailing winds have been from the southwest.

The highest velocity of the wind during sny year was from the southwest, 38 miles on the 23d, 1891.

OUR RESOURCES.

Mr Thos Harris the curator of the State Museum has published in the N O Agricultural Bullet'n a a graphic description of the mineral resources of Wake county-Alluding to the plum bage or black lead in Wake he says:

Beginning on Mine Creek, some seven or eight miles northwest of Raleigh the vein passes to the southward, outeropping in many places and disappears some twelve miles south of the city. On Mine Creek and for several miles south of it, on the lands of Maj Tucker, or Messrs Pullen. Blake, Castleberry and others, the vein has been opened in perhaps a dozen places and the graphite occasi nally mineu and shipped to northern markets It was simply dug and shipped in car load lots, in the crude condition, going usually to Philadelphia or New York.

O' course, when disposed of in this way, the mineral is full of impurities and the profit in the work was small, for the freight had to be paid on much of the crude material which was worthless.

The principal uses of graphite are for stove polish, foundry facings, crucibles and melting pots, pigments, lubrication and lead pencils. The very finest grade is used for electratyping. As an example of the profit which can be made out of a raw material, take a six oz cake of stove polish, costing at retail ten cents, The manufacturer's price is about sixteen cents per pound. Our graphite can be mined at one dollar and fifty cents per ton in the crude condition When washed and pressed into blocks of stove polish the profit will be enorm-


