

**THE COBWEB CURE.**

Not a Fine Spun Theory, but a Proved Specific for Asthma.

For several years, in fact, almost since infancy, Miss Katie Faber, the 17 year old daughter of George Faber, of Wooster, O, has been a constant sufferer with asthma. Her father spent hundreds of dollars with noted specialists, but there was no permanent relief. About a year ago while Miss Faber was suffering from one unusually severe attack, a neighbor who had happened in said that a missionary who had returned from India had told her that the Hindoos cured asthma with cobwebs, and explained that the method of taking it was to gather a "web," roll it into a pellet and swallow it.

Neither the young lady's mother, nor the lady who had told of the cure, had any faith in it, as they were afraid of poison. Not long after Miss Faber had a very severe attack of the disease, and, to use her mother's words: "Katie said 'I may just as well be dead as suffer this way and I am going to try the cobweb cure.'"
