FIRE ON AMERICANS.

Sailors From the Crosby Shot by Dominion Troops Without Cause.

The steamship George A Clyde arrived at New York from San Domingo, with information about an outrage perpetrated upon American seamen by the San Domingo authorities that is likely to raise international complications between the two Governments.

Two seamen, Carl Crosby and First Officer Brooks, of the American schooner Henry Crosby, were shot and seriously injured by San Domingo soldiers. The Crosby was trying to make the port of Azua, which is ninety miles from San Domingo City. December 11. The captain lost his bearings and approached the port of Old Azua, ten miles distant from Azua.

The first officer said four seamen got into a boat and pulled for the shore. When 300 yards out a file of soldiers in the uniform of the Dominican Government came running down to the beach. When they reached the edge of the water they drew up in line and leveling their carbines at the men in the small boat fired two volleys.

The sailors pulled for the schooner, where it was found that the first officer had received a bullet in the shoulder and that a seaman had been struck by several balls. A bad wound in the back made it doubtful if the man would recover.

The captain hoisted sail and, after a time, reached the port of Azua. From there he sent information of the outrage to the new United States Consul General at San Domingo City and to the United States authorities at Washington. No explanation or satisfaction was given to the American skipper by the Dominican Government. The schooner was flying the Stars and Stripes in plain view.

Information was also brought by the George Clyde in relation to the reported outbreak in that country and the killing of General Joyquin Campos, who, it was reported had been assassinated by Government people, who caused his immediate family to be killed. The information brought shows that General Campos was the only one killed, but instead of being killed by orders of President Heaureaux, he was murdered by one of the conspirators against the Government.
