### Funeral of Dr. E. Burke Haywood.

Seldom, if ever, has there been such demonstrations of sorrow as have been shown on the part of all our people over the death of Dr E Burke Haywood, and it culminated this morning by the largest and most impressive funeral ever seen in Raleigh. It was announced that the services would take place from Christ church at 11 o'clock, but before the arrival of that hour a large concourse of people representing all classes and shades of society wended their way to the church filling it to the utmost capacity. The solemn cortege arrived at the proper time accompanied by a large concourse that had assembled at the residences. Among the various attendants were delegations of Confederate veterans, officers, teachers and pupils of the institution for the deaf and dumb and blind representatives from the A and M college, Peace institute, St Mary's, insane asylum and the Academy of Medicine was fully represented by most of the physicians of the city. The services in the church were of the most impressive character, conducted by the rector, Rev Dr M M Marshall.

The floral decorations were of the highest order for beauty and design, and every tribute of respect of an appropriate kind was paid to the "beloved physician."

At the conclusion of the services at the church the solemn procession wended its way to the cemetery. The members of the Raleigh Academy of Medicine acted as honorary pall bearers.

The following colored friends of the lamented dead bore the caasket: Geo Bryant, Dave Thompson, Morris Watts, Frank Debnan, Buck Williams and Charles Cardwell.

During the funeral ceremonies the most solemn gloom pervaded the entire city. It was confined to no class, color or creed, but our people all joined in the general sorrow. No event in our midst of a similar kind has ever drawn forth more marks of genuine sympathy. All felt that our community had sustained a heavy loss while each individual mourned as if a dear friend "had crossed the river."

We should not omit to mention that the state, city and county officials paid due homage by their presence and otherwise to the lamented dead.

For ourselves, we can only render the poor homage of earnest sympathy for the afflicted family in the loss of one who, in life was one of our most devoted friends, and whose memory we will cherish as a bright oasis in the troubles and trials of life. "Peace to his ashes."

### Entertainments.

On Monday night next at Metropolitan hall an entertainment will be given for the special benefit of the work being done by the King's Daughters. It will consist of a lecture followed by scenes of the greatest interest, from the Holy Land. It will be illustrated by Prof Asad Ramee and his sister, Miss H. H. from Damascus. Her singing is superb in her own language. A prominent feature will be a lecture on Syria, and an exhibition of a Syrian marriage. There will be a number of young people dressed in native costumes.

The proceeds are for the united order of the King's Daughters to benefit the many cases of sickness and distress. Admission, adults, 25c; children, 15c. Tickets on sale at book stores where reserved seats can be had.

The funeral of the late Mrs Nancy L Beddinsfield took place at 3:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon at the residence of her son in law Mr E F Spears on East Martin street, and was conducted by Rev L Branson. There was a large attendance. The remains were interred in the City Cemetery. The following persons acted as pall bearers: T W Blake, John T Pullen, Samue Walker, S M Richardson, O P Spruill and A R Lane.
