Stephen H Lane, the newly appointed collector at New Berne has filed his bond for \$10,000.

It is reported that Hon John Nichols will be a candidate for State Treasurer on the coalition ticket.

The New York visitors will be received in a manner highly creditable to Raleigh.

Manager Jerman will soon present to the people of Raleigh a first class opera troupe at the Academy of Music.

Mrs Lyman, widow of Bishop Lyman has gone to Buncombe county to reside. She offers for sale her residence in this city.

The german which was postponed on last Tuesday night, will take place this evening at the mansion from 8:30 to 12 o'clock.

The failure of Maj J Turner Morehead will amount to \$115,000. It is claimed that the assets will pay all claims.
