CITY IN BRIEF.

A new vault is being put in the old Rosenbaum building for the use of the Savings Bank.

L B Carehart, colored, took the oath to practice law before Hon R F Hoke this morning.

Rev E H Whitaker will preach at Brooklyn at 4 p m tomorrow instead of at night. There will be no night service.

There were a good many country wagons in town today loaded with all kinds of produce. The market is fairly glutted with eggs.
