**DOWN NIAGARA'S RAPIDS.**

The Body of a Woman on a Cake of Ice  
Seen Whirling to the Falls.

A Niagara Falls dispatch says: A sensational story is told by Master Edwin Whitney, son of Mr and Mrs Solon Whitney, of that city. It was in effect that he saw at the house of his grandfather, Major Whitney, the body of a woman float past the rear of the house down through the rapids and over the falls.

The hour was about 8:30 in the morning. Master Whitney said he saw the object on a cake of ice, and that there could be no mistake about it being a woman. He called the attention of the two painters at work on the veranda on the river side of the Whitney mansion, and they also thought it was a body.
