

THE STRIKING TAILORS

Will Hold an Immense Mass Meeting Next Week.

THE WANT OF PUBLIC SYMPATHY

THE OBJECT OF THIS BIG MEETING IS TO CONVINCING PEOPLE

That the Garment Worker's Grievance Justify Them in Striking—The Strike Spreads to Philadelphia, Also to Newark.

Special to The Tribune. New York, May 20.—The various branches of the United Garment Workers of America expect to hold a public demonstration early next week...

"Labor organizations throughout the city are in sympathy with us, and will assist us. All the branches, on the evening of the mass-meeting, will assemble in the neighborhood of Wall-halla Hall and march to the meeting place...

The Executive Committee of the Garment makers this morning began the task of formulating the wage scale. One faction approves of the weekly wage system, while another wants the piecework system.

When Leader Schoenfeld was asked about the report that the State Board of Arbitration and Mediation would make an effort to adjust the difficulties, he replied that the union would be willing to allow any commission or society to investigate existing conditions.

A committee from the Women Tailors' Union called at the headquarters to-day and held a conference with the Executive Board.

It is reported that Jacob Baroness is making a tour of the Eastern manufacturing centers, with a view of spreading the strike movement.

There are 125 public fire-hydrants and twenty-five private fire hydrants, making 150, which gives ample fire protection.
