REMAINS REACH DURHAM

Barber's Remains Accompanied from Raleigh to Durham by His Brother—Ex-Mayor McCown Spending Time in Jail Presently.

(Special to The Evening Times.) Durham, N. C., Sept. 7.—The remains of William A. Barber, who killed himself at the Hotel Yarbrough yesterday afternoon, reached Durham on the early morning train to-day and were taken to the home of his aged parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Barber, some four miles south of the city, where the interment took place in the family burying ground this afternoon at 2 o'clock. The body was accompanied to Durham by Walter F. Barber, brother of the deceased who went down to Raleigh last evening for the purpose of identification and to bring the body to Durham.

The dead man was about 35 years of age and he left here on Tuesday morning. He said he was going to Raleigh and Norfolk. He left father and mother one brother and five sisters. While given to drink at times, he was considered a quiet and hard working man. Until last Monday he was employed as one of the foremen in the Bull factory. Then he quarreled with one of the foremen over him and quit his work.

His aged father learned of the suicide early last evening by a messenger sent to his home south of the city. He came up to the city early this morning still hoping that it was not his son who had taken his own life.

Contract has been given for the erection of the Durham city high school building. This building will cost \$35,000, this being for the building alone. The lot cost \$10,000. The contract was awarded to Contractor I. G. Lawrence, of this city. Work is to begin at once, or rather as early as possible, and the work will be pushed to completion. Just now the city schools are in a badly crowded condition and it will take the new high school building to relieve the congested condition of affairs. With this building completed the higher scholars will be taken to it and the other buildings will be used for the lower grades.

The schools this year have the largest attendance of any year in the history of the schools of this city. There have already been enrolled more than 2,300 pupils. Of these there are about 250 first graders. This is a larger number of beginners than ever before.

Ex-Mayor M. E. McCown, who is serving 30 days sentence for contempt of court, is spending his time as pleasant as could be expected under the circumstances. Each day there are quite a large number of his friends to visit the jail. He is carried reading matter, fruits and every kind of little dainty and things that will help him pass away the weary hours.

He expressed himself as not being greatly surprised at the action of the Supreme Court in upholding the decision of Judge Ward. He has now settled down to serve his 30-day sentence with no hope of getting any relief.

Yesterday afternoon the county commissioners decided to take up the new road to the Wake county line as the next road to macadamize. This will give two roads from Durham to the Wake line—that is, two of the improved roads. There was quite a contest as to which road should be taken up, many contending that the road from here to Chapel Hill should be improved.

BLOODY RIOTS IN FAIR JAPAN

A Mob Attacked and Burned the Official Residence of the Minister of Home Affairs and Afterwards Attack Several Police Stations.

(By the Associated Press.) Tokio, Japan, Tuesday Evening, Sept. 6.—Serious rioting followed the attack on the office of the Kaku-min Shimbusu, the government organ, and the mob attacked and burned the official residence of the Minister of Home Affairs.

Threatening demonstrations occurred in the neighborhood of the official homes of Premier Katsura and Baron Komura, the foreign minister, who is now in the United States but the police succeeded in preventing injury to the occupants or damage to the houses. The situation to-night is threatening.

During the rioting of Tuesday night fifteen smaller police stations and two larger ones were destroyed. After midnight another attempt was made against the Kaku-min Shimbusu office, but the police dispersed the attackers. It is claimed the turbulence resulted from the indiscriminate closing of Hibya Park and the denial of a right to publicly meet. It is estimated that two are dead and five hundred wounded, among whom are two hundred policemen.

A mob burned and destroyed ten Christian churches and one mission house school on Wednesday night. The people were not injured.

Purpose of the Mob. Another demonstration is planned for September 8th, and it is believed the strongest measures will be necessary to prevent serious rioting and bloodshed. A member of the mob which burned the home of the Minister's residence, said to the Associated Press: "We burned the house for the purpose of attracting the attention of the Emperor. We want him to refuse to ratify the treaty. We believe those surrounding him, prevent him from correctly understanding the popular attitude toward a disgraceful and humiliating peace."

(Continued from First Page.) the fever situation yesterday beyond the small number of cases reported and the few deaths. A heavy rain fell Wednesday afternoon, following ten days of similar weather. This, however, has not increased the number of cases nor the mortality, a fact which speaks well for the efficient work of the Marine Hospital Service surgeons.

There has been some demand here for a quarantine of the city against the infection, on account of the danger of reinfection, but Dr. White does not believe it would be effective. However, all avenues of ingress to the city are being watched.
