CHICAGO WHEAT AND CORN.

Forecasted whether in the Northwest Advancing the Price of Wheat.

Chicago, Ill., Sept. 7.—Continued weather in the Northwest advanced December wheat to 82 1/2 c. On matured sales December corn sold up to 45 c.

CONDITION OF COTTON MARKET.

A Very Steady Undertone Was the Best Feature of the Day. (Special to The Evening Times.)
New York, Sept. 7.—Liverpool was an unexpectedly weak to-day that the trade here feel a reaction is due there to-morrow and have been buyers on a moderate scale all day. Transactions have been limited, as the uncertainty caused by the Bureau's report of condition has so confused merchants and spinners alike that they are waiting until their opinions can be formed on the Bureau's figures. It is not believed that any large part of the so-called bull pool holdings have been sold, though it is thought some of the minor members have disposed of at least a portion of their cotton.

MILLER & CO.'S DAILY REVIEW.

The Price Question Will Have an Immense Influence With Farmers. (Special to The Evening Times.)
New York, Sept. 7.—The sentiment in Liverpool is growing more bearish and price proclaims an early and severe break in prices. Still there was some heavy quiet buying which a few suspected as being for the account of the leading bear. All eyes are turned on Asheville, but the only news which has so far come from there is the announcement that the present crop coefficient of 73.3 points to a yield of 2,588,133 bales.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON LETTER.

It is Reported That the Southern Cotton Growers' Association Has Estimated The Growing Crop at Ten Million Bales. (Special to The Evening Times.)
New Orleans, La., Sept. 6.—American speculative markets failed to appreciate the steadiness of the Liverpool market to-day and instead of doing much better, opened a few points lower. December here at 10.40 against 10.44 yesterday, afterwards selling off 4 points additional, to 10.36 for December but finally closing at 10.46. Mr. Ellison's figures on invisible stocks in Europe, 880,000 against 410,000 last year, 470,000 larger and Mr. Hesters' excess of 82,000 as the invisible supply, had by American mills 234,000 compared with 152,000 at the end of last August one year ago, or a total excess of 552,000 bales in the invisible supply when compared with 1904, was made the basis for the further attack upon the market to-day.

In this connection, it is only fair to say that Mr. Ellison's figures are quite liberal for mill stocks, whereas his estimate for last season's consumption was much too low, about 11,400,000 against 11,883,000. The visible and invisible supply is placed at 2,757,000 bales. Traders, however, do not seem to realize that spinners takings the past season were 12,397,000 bales and that if the world was to take a little amount this season, providing it was obtainable that it would require a crop this year of 12,397,000 bales to supply the demand for the visible and invisible supply at the end of next August is to be larger than what is supposed to be carried over this year.

the understanding that the Southern Cotton Association in session at Asheville, N. C., has estimated the growing crop at ten million bales and has placed the minimum price at which the present crop is to be sold at about 10 cents per pound. As news from the Liverpool to-day were to the effect that farmers were refusing to sell at the dealer and at a matter of fact we know that offerings from the country were not so free. Stocks here closed steady and unchanged, the demand being better, with 100, and 800 to arrive, including 10 1/2-16.
