PAY THE LAST SAD TRIBUTE

In the Memory of the Late Mayor Collins, of Boston, While Here was All Over the City Was Generally Suspended.

Boston, Mass., Sept. 15.—The funeral services over the late Mayor Collins were held at the Roman Catholic Cathedral of the Holy Cross this morning in the presence of many citizens prominent in State and national affairs and delegations from civic, fraternal and military organizations. Within sanctuary were a large number of high dignitaries of the Catholic Church and 150 priests. Business was generally suspended during the period of the services, while the municipal offices, courts and schools were closed for the day. The city buildings and private business structures were draped in black and flags were hung at half mast all over the city and on the shipping in the harbor.

Archbishop Williams pronounced final absolution over the body. There was no sermon.
