This work, after a lapse of forty years, is now under way by the John A. Lowell Bank Note Company, of Boston, who are using for this purpose the exact photograph made at General Lee's residence in Richmond a few days after the surrender, which picture has always been considered by the Lee family and friends as the most perfect likeness ever taken of the general at this period. The work, when finished, will be of the highest art of steel engraving, so that it will thus be preserved for all future time.

NEW CORPORATIONS.

Nearly \$200,000—Charlotte, N. C., Sept. 19.—New Bank and Another Greater Concern.

The Secretary of State to-day granted charters to the Capital Manufacturing Company, another concern for Charlotte, with a capitalization of \$100,000. One-half of the capital stock will be preferred and half common. Messrs. E. A. Smith and A. H. Washburn, of Charlotte, and T. G. Cox, of Tazewell, Mass., are incorporators.

The Whitford Hardware Company, at New Bern, will conduct a wholesale and retail business in that place. Capital stock is \$2,500 paid in. Incorporators are Messrs. Hardy, John H. and Daniel H. Whitford and Mrs. Lottie E. Williams, all residents of New Bern.

The Farmers and Merchants Bank will be opened at Spring Hope, in Nash county, and will do a general and savings business. Incorporators are W. H. and W. R. Griffin, C. B. Brantley, A. F. May, R. E. Copeland, S. A. Woodard, J. E. Drake, L. N. Williams, C. E. May, T. C. May, G. J. May, J. O. May and A. C. Yarbrough. The capital stock is for \$25,000, and they will commence business with \$5,000.

Elkin, in Surry county, comes forward with a furniture company, known as the Reich-Walsh Furniture Company, to do a wholesale and retail business, and with a capitalization of \$25,500, with \$5,500 paid in. Incorporators are W. S. Reich, J. F. Walsh, W. H. Sharpe and W. M. Matvey.
