CLAIMS ROYAL DESCENT.

Chicago Man Declares He is Great Grandson of George Fourth.

(By the Associated Press.) Chicago, Nov. 18 .- James L. Ord, of this city, who claims to be the great-grandson of George IV., of England, and Mrs. Maria M. Smyth Fitzherbert, whose marriage was shown to be valid by papers which were opened in London last Friday, declared to-day that he would take steps to claim a share in the estate which it is claimed was left by King George and Mrs. Fitzherbert. Mr. Ord estimates the gross value of the estate at \$125,000,000.

His title to the estate, he says, comes through his father, who is the sole surviving son of a son of King George and Mrs. Fitzherbert. The last mentioned son came in 1810 to the United States, where he was known as John S. Ord.

NO RIVER AND HARBOR BILL. Congress will Make no Appro-

printions. (By the Associated Press.) Washington, Nov. 13.—The Post tolay says:

"No general river and harbor bill will be passed by Congress at the approaching session." This forecast was made by Representative Burton of Ohio, chairman of the rivers and harbors committee, before he left Washington for Hot Springs, Va., for a short vacation.
