dictatorship, and you may be sure that at the first evidence of this Witte will step down and out.

Count Witte takes the ground that the ministry is only a stop-gap to transfer the power into the hands of the national assembly, and therefore he will not undertake to bind the country by temporary laws or a policy, which the representatives of the nation should decide for themselves. This is the theory on which complete, universal suffrage will be refused.

The situation in the Baltic provinces is now the most grave of the empire's conditions. It approaches civil war, and the government has been forced to appoint a governor general with sweeping administrative powers to try to restore order. All the troops in these provinces have been placed under his command. The importation of arms, which have been entering the country in large quantities, and the sale of weapons have been prohibited, and the authorities are even empowered to arrest for three months under an administrative order persons having arms in their possession.

Polish Clergy's Demands.
Warsaw, Russian Poland, Dec. 13.—A meeting of 47 Catholic clergymen of Russian Poland, after a ten hours' session during the night, resolved this morning to demand autonomy for Poland and its own parliament, general secret ballot, the reinstatement of the Polish language in government offices, the abolition of capital punishment and full amnesty for political prisoners.

The official gazette this morning published a list of 293 post and telegraph clerks who have been dismissed for striking.

Alarming Reports From Riga.
St. Petersburg, Tuesday, Dec. 12 (night), via Eydtkuhnen, East Prussia, Dec. 13.—Reports are in circulation to the effect that the insurgents at Riga have captured the fortress there. Inquiries made at the ministry of the interior resulted in the statement being made that the government's advices do not confirm the capture of the fortress and the seizure of the governor. The situation, however, is admitted to be grave. The commander at Riga yesterday appealed for additional troops which were despatched.

Death of W. H. Overby.
Mr. W. H. Overby died yesterday afternoon at his home just southwest of the city. He leaves a family and a sister, Mrs. W. W. Willis. Mr. Overby was an industrious man and his death is deplored by many friends. The funeral was held this afternoon from the residence.

Gans and Sullivan.
(By the Associated Press.)
San Francisco, Cal., Dec. 13.—Champion Joe Gans and Mike (Twin) Sullivan, signed articles last night to box 20 rounds next month at Woodward's Pavilion. They will weigh in at 142 pounds. The fight will probably take place on January 19. The men will divide 50 per cent. of the gross receipts, the winner to take 60 per cent. and the loser 40 per cent.

\$100,000 TO SCHOOLS

Sum from State Given to Counties

Largest Amount, \$4,796, Given to Mecklenburg and the Counties, \$200, to Clay—Wake Gets \$2,795.

The State Superintendent of Public Instruction today made the appropriation of the first \$100,000 appropriated for the public schools by the Legislature. The money will be distributed in January.

There are 152,844 white children, 231,043 colored, and 1,847 Chinese, total 385,734. The number of children divided into \$100,000 gave the per capita appropriation as \$142.44. The number of children in each county was multiplied by this decimal and that amount given the county respectively.

Wake county, with 19,865 children, gets \$2,795.44; Guilford, with 18,924, gets \$2,700.32; Mecklenburg leads, with 4,775 children, and receives \$2,792.78. Clay receives the smallest amount, \$229.26.

DR. LLOYD WON'T ACCEPT CALL

(By the Associated Press.)
Norfolk, Va., Dec. 13.—Rev. Dr. Arthur H. Lloyd, missionary secretary of the Episcopal Church in America, today sent from New York his official declination of the coadjutor bishopric of Southern Virginia.

A new bishop will be elected at Portsmouth in May. Rev. Dr. Tucker, of Norfolk; Rev. Dr. Bryan, of Petersburg, and Rev. Dr. John Lloyd, of Lynchburg, are prominently mentioned for the bishopric. Dr. Arthur Lloyd had previously declined the bishoprics of Mississippi and Kentucky.

RESULTS IN BOSTON.

Seven Democrats and Six Republicans on Board of Aldermen.
(By the Associated Press.)
Boston, Mass., Dec. 13.—Seven Democrats and six Republicans were elected members of the Boston board of aldermen yesterday and the new common council stands 46 Democrats to 29 Republicans.

The five candidates for the school committee endorsed by the Republicans and the public school association were successful. Of these three also were supported by the Democrats.

The liquor license vote of the city was: Yeas, 55,175; noes, 26,450.

James M. Curley, who served a jail sentence a year ago for impersonating another at a civil service examination, was re-elected alderman on the Democratic ticket, despite much opposition.

The present board of aldermen is made up of ten Democrats and three Republicans, and the present common council contains 49 Democrats and 26 Republicans.

The license vote last year was: Yeas, 41,854; noes, 20,192.

NEW BATTLESHIPS.

Comparative Building Time by Government and Private Ship-Yard Companies.
(By the Associated Press.)
Washington, Dec. 13.—Because she is building in a government navy yard, the battleship Connecticut, now nearing completion at New York, will probably not have her builders' trial until after the vessel has been placed in commission and can carry a regular navy crew.

The Connecticut is a sister ship of the Louisiana, now under construction by the Newport News Ship-Building and Drydock Company, and now having her trial. The two vessels were authorized at the same time, and their construction is being closely watched by the Navy Department, so that a report may be made to Congress upon the comparative time required for the construction of battleships by the government and by private ship-yard companies.

The Connecticut is ready for trial, there being little appreciable difference in the degree of completion of the two ships, but she will probably not be commissioned before April. The Louisiana will be commissioned also in the spring, and the time of building will probably be reckoned from the time of the award of the contracts to the time of the commission of the Louisiana and the trial on the Connecticut, inasmuch as both ships will be commissioned as soon as possible and the latter will be tried as soon after commissioning as is possible.
