Washington, Dec. 12.—In preparation of that period of the conference of Red Cross shipman Northwest, the following letter to the Secretary of the Hague Conference was addressed to the following letter to the Secretary of the Hague Conference:

"You have been our guest of visiting class I of Article VIII of the articles for the government of the navy by insulating and subsequently consulting one of your fellow shipmen and of conduct to the prejudice of good order and discipline by engaging in a fight with the same shipman. These offenses on your part have led to a calamity as clearly unforgivable by you as an act of war. It is hoped, however, that you will, in the future, be guided by the laws of your country, your responsibility of the importance of your oath, your yielding to force and every passion when tempted by a sense of wrong, have borne fruits as bitter than your worst punishment has been already suffered. The official sentence of the court which tried you leaves you a member of the honorable profession you have chosen. In that great school of self-sacrifice and obedience, a life useful to your country will, it is hoped, atone for grave faults which have clouded the early years of your service.

"You will acknowledge receipt of this letter, and it will be entered on your official record. Respectfully, (Signed) CHARLES J. BONAPARTE, Secretary. Midshipman Minor Northwest, U. S. Naval Academy, Annapolis, Md."

The vessel will arrive here late this afternoon. In the Nordland's steerage are nearly 600 immigrants, a majority of whom are Jewish refugees from Russia.

**Students Called Home.** Misses Ada, Lois and Elizabeth Edwards, all students at Peace Institute, were summoned to their home at Lawry, Fla., to-day by a telegram announcing the death of their father.

**State News.** Raleigh, N. C., Dec. 12, Special: Dispensary was voted in here on Monday in preference to barrooms by 62 to 34. A number of prohibitionists refused to vote.

New Bern, N. C., Dec. 12, Special: The remains of Mrs. J. F. Koonce, a prominent citizen of Jacksonville, N. C., passed through here, being transferred here to a special train, which conveyed them to Jacksonville. Mrs. Koonce died in Wilson.

Wilmington, N. C., Dec. 12, Special: Twelve or fifteen Italian immigrants arrived here on the Clyde Line steamer New York. They went to Pender county to settle on the land of the Carolina Trucking and Developing Company.

Fayetteville, N. C., Dec. 12, Special: The grand lodge of colored Masons is in session here in the 36th annual convention. There are about 300 delegates present, representing 169 lodges. The reports show the order to be in a very prosperous condition. The order last year paid out \$7,000 to widows and orphans.

New Bern, N. C., Dec. 12, Special: The city authorities are getting in earnest about suppressing blind tigers. The negro, John Gillette, who was captured with several flasks of liquor on his person, was put to the rack. This was done in order to discover whether he would repeat a story told the police when he was drunk. He did repeat it, giving out information as to where he obtained his liquor, which will prove valuable in the future. He claims to have stolen the liquor from parties whose names have not been disclosed.

Salisbury, N. C., Dec. 12, Special: The funeral of Mr. A. E. Beaver, a prominent citizen of China Grove, Rowan county, took place yesterday near his home. Mr. Beaver died Sunday night of blood poisoning. About three weeks ago he had one of his arms badly cut in a wood saw near his home. His condition, while not considered dangerous at first, grew gradually worse until tetanus developed.

Fremont, N. C., Dec. 12, Special: Postmaster Best's troubles are still the source of conversation on the streets here. He is charged with a shortage in funds, but this is due to his inefficiency to keep the books and the amount will be made good by him. Mr. John W. Smith, who preceded Best as postmaster, is in charge of the office, and in all likelihood will be re-appointed, though there will be several applicants for the position. Your correspondent is informed that no criminal charge will be brought against Postmaster Best.

Fremont, N. C., Dec. 12, Special: The new thirty-room brick hotel, which Mr. A. H. Jarman is having erected, will soon be completed. The hotel will be equipped with hot and cold water facilities and electric lights from its own plants. Mr. Jarman will also furnish his store with electric lights, and several other merchants have contracted with him for power to furnish electricity to their stores. Ex-Senator B. E. Aycock and Mr. John B. Exum, who have recently had erected handsome residences, will also equip them with electric lights from their own plants. Within another year the whole town will be lighted by electricity. Twenty-five new dwellings are now in course of construction in Fremont, and several others are contracted for. More building has been done here in the past two years than in any previous ten years.
