

FEARED SHE'D GROW BLIND

World Famous Pianiste Has
Disappeared

ELUDED ATTENDANTS

Her Departure Noticed Five Minutes
After She Had Left Home But
Husband and Searchers Could Find
Absolutely no Trace of Her.

(By the Associated Press.)
Chicago, Feb. 12.—Mrs. Francis
Blomfield-Zeisler, the world famous
pianiste, has disappeared from her
home, and the police have been asked
by her husband to search for her. Mrs.
Zeisler has for some time been suffer-
ing with melancholia, and the
members of her family are apprehensive
that harm has befallen her.

The chief cause of the mental de-
pression of Mrs. Zeisler was her fear
of becoming blind. For more than a
year she had been under the care of an
eye specialist, but her eyesight did not
materially improve. She was greatly
worried over the fact that her failing
eyesight might compel the abandon-
ment of her career as a pianiste and
constant brooding over the matter
brought on at times attacks of pro-
nounced melancholia.

She was compelled to cancel all of
her public engagements for this season,
and several weeks ago entered a sanitarium
near Chicago, from which she
returned in greatly improved health.
About a month ago, however, another
attack of mental depression overcame
her, and she has been unable to throw
it off. In addition to this she was con-
stantly becoming more near-sighted.
Attendants were always with her, but
today she eluded them and left the
house. She was missed almost imme-
diately, and five minutes after she
had left the house her husband har-
ried in pursuit. Since leaving the
house absolutely nothing has been
heard of her by any of her friends.

Mrs. Zeisler is one of the most fa-
mous pianiste in the world. She is a
native of Silesia, but came to this
country when but two years of age.
Her early musical education was ac-
quired in this city and she afterward
studied for a time in Europe. She has
made repeated tours of this country and
of Europe, being always received with
enthusiasm by the public and musical
critics.

She is a member of many leading
women clubs, and prominent socially.
Her husband, Sigmund Zeisler, is a
wealthy and prominent attorney.

EXPOSITION OPENS

APRIL 26, 1907

Norfolk, Va., Feb. 12.—The formal
opening of the Jamestown Exposition
has been set for April 26, 1907, instead
of May 15, 1907, as originally planned.
It was on April 25, 1867, that the Eng-
lish settlers in the London company
first embarked at Cape Henry, Virginia,
and in the desire to fittingly celebrate
the 300th anniversary of that event as
well as the tercentennial of the settle-
ment at Jamestown, May 15, is found
the reason for changing the date of the
formal opening. The celebration of the
landing anniversary, May 13, will be
made the occasion of a minor cele-
bration, which will be the greatest
event of the exposition.

75 MILES IN 51 MINUTES.

(By the Associated Press.)
Havana, Feb. 12.—The two-hun-
dred mile automobile race began to-
day in fine weather, with the course
in splendid condition and with a
large crowd present. Bernin, driving
W. Gould Brokaw's ninety horse-
power machine, covered the first lap
in 54.3 and 75 miles in 51 minutes.
On the first return trip from San
Cristobal, Demagot, driving Luis
Lara's eighty horsepower machine,
covered the distance in forty-one
minutes, six seconds.

The rate per hour for the first half
of the race was 62 1/2 miles, three-
quarters of a mile faster than the
average time in the race for the
Vanderbilt cup.
Demagot seemed to be easily
beating Bernin on the second lap.
Lancia, driving E. F. Conill's 110-
horse power machine, and Cedeno, who
drives Gustav Beck's 100-horse power
car, are out of the race. Lancia's ma-
chine, Ajesta Battista, was thrown
out, and Cedeno's machine turned over
at a sharp curve near Candelaria.
Lancia succeeded in obtaining the ser-
vices of a physician to attend Battista.

fidelity in dealing with the problem;
said the giving of rates by the gov-
ernment would not cure the evil and
concluded that that could only be
effected by a provision for the pun-
ishment of those who violate the law
by giving rebates. Regarding re-
bates he said:
"The rebates have been a wrong
and injustice to the people and a
serious injury to the railroads them-
selves. I do not think that it would
be possible to pass legislation too
drastic for the purpose of stopping
these discriminations between per-
sons. We have a law now upon the
statute books which, so far as prop-
riety can go, ought to be suffi-
cient. It undoubtedly has largely
checked rebates, but it has not stop-
ped them entirely. To make the law
thoroughly efficient we ought to add,
in my judgment, three provisions.
We should restore the former pen-
alties of the interstate commerce law—
which should not have been repealed
—and make these secret evasions of
the published rates punishable by
imprisonment. The men who perpe-
trate these evasions in defiance of the
law suffer but little by a fine, even
if it be a heavy one. Their resources
are too large to make a money pen-
alty a serious one. For this very
reason they are persons who would
feel acutely a punishment by im-
prisonment, and that penalty ought
to be provided in any law which we
pass."
Mr. Lodge combatted the idea that
the railroads are owned by a few men
and that they are inimical and in-
dependent of other interests. He said:
"We all want to see the settled and
established sections of the country
thrive, but to the railroads the well-
being of such places is a matter of life
and death. A sudden and ill consid-
ered revolution in our methods of rail-
road management would bring on a
business panic, reduce wages and prob-
ably carry disaster to our trade and
commerce in a degree which is impos-
sible to estimate."
Mr. Lodge expressed the opinion that
there should be ample provision for
review of the findings of the commis-
sion by the courts. He concluded:
"There seem to be now prophets of
a new dispensation, who wish to de-
part from the line marked out by the
present in his message and accepted
in the house bill of last year by remov-
ing so far as possible from the proposed
law all proper provisions for review by
the courts. This seems to me to strike
at the very heart of the measure. I am
anxious to see this legislation; I am
not yet prepared to substitute for the
courts of the United States an executive
commission. Legislation cannot pre-
vent an appeal to the courts if it is al-
leged that the rate is confiscatory. But
this is a very narrow ground and very
limited right. A rate may not be ab-
solutely confiscatory and yet may be
in the highest degree unjust and unre-
asonable, and indeed well high ruinous.
I am not sure that it would be possible
to deprive a citizen by legislation of
the right to appeal to the courts as to
the justice and reasonableness of a
given rate, which is a purely judicial
question. But no attempt ought to be
made, either directly or indirectly by
silence or by assertion, to destroy this
privilege, or, rather, this right. We
are about to pass a great measure from
which I hope great good may come,
but one in which its operation will af-
fect the property and interests of mil-
lions of our fellow citizens. It should
be guarded with scrupulous care, but
above all it should provide that no man
should be deprived of the opportunity
to go to the courts in defense of his
rights if he thinks those rights are
evaded."

BROTHERS-IN-LAW FIGHT

Col. Fremont and Chas. York
of Fremont Stock Co.

They Were in Justice R. G. Reid's
Court Saturday Night—Fall Out
About Money Matters—Col. Fre-
mont Assailed York—Latter Left
the Company Here—Costs Paid.

There was a session of Justice R.
G. Reid's court after twelve o'clock
Saturday night for the purpose of
hearing a charge preferred by Chas.
York of the Fremont Stock Company,
against Col. W. H. Fremont, the
manager, for an assault on York just
after the final performance of the
management of the Academy of Music
Saturday night.

Fremont and York are brothers-in-
law, having married sisters, and York
was a member of the troupe. He
claimed that there was more money
due him than was paid and the quar-
rel grew out of a discussion of the
matter.
Justice Reid said it seemed to have
been a case of simple assault and
Colonel Fremont being anxious to get
away with his company for their next
engagement, he just taxed him with
the assault in the case, he pleading
guilty to simple assault. It is un-
derstood that York left the company
here. W. B. Jones appeared for the
defense of Colonel Fremont.

HAD BOMBS, DAGGERS AND EXPLOSIVE LIQUIDS

(By the Associated Press.)
Chicago, Feb. 12.—An Italian,
said by the police to be an agent of
an Italian secret society, was arrest-
ed after a hard fight in the yards of
the Pittsburgh, Fort Wayne and Chi-
cago Railroad. A bottle of nitro-
glycerine, a bomb six inches long,
a double-edged stiletto a foot long and
six vials containing colorless liquids
of unknown composition were taken
from the man before he was locked up.
Three companions escaped.
In addition to the collection of ex-
plosives and liquids taken from the
Italian, he was found to have five
\$100 confederate bills and a saw
twelve inches long, made for the pur-
pose of cutting iron.
He gave his name as Frank Per-
grin, 25 years old. He said he was
from Mississippi. According to the
police he hinted that he was on a
"mission" and referred to the Mafia
society.

THE TENNESSEE BEGINS HER ENDURANCE RUN.

Rockland, Me., Feb. 12.—The
armored cruiser Tennessee today be-
gan her four hours endurance run,
which commenced at Monhegan Is-
land and was scheduled to end near
Cape Anne. She passed Whitehead
shortly after 8 o'clock and began to
develop a high rate of speed. At 9
o'clock she passed Monhegan Island
on the inside passage, a different
course from that which the other ves-
sels have taken at the start. The
weather was a trifle hazy and a very
faint breeze was blowing. The
cruiser is required to sustain 22
knots an hour on this run. At the
completion of the trial she will keep
on to Boston light where the trial
board will leave her. Then she will
continue on to Philadelphia for com-
pletion by her builders, William
Cramp & Son.
