About half a dozen petitions have been lodged against other elections of similar grounds.

On the day that you take title you insert this advertisement—under heads "Real Estate for Sale" and "Business Opportunities":

FOR SALE—Four lots, 25x100, single or together; \$500 per lot, cash. Ideal factory site; or favorable loan may be secured for building apartment houses or stores. Address, Y, etc.

In course of ten days several prospective buyers are interviewed, including one who is looking for a factory site. Coming to terms with him, he assumes the \$800 mortgage and pays you balance in cash.

Your total expenses in the negotiations, including title search and advertising, amount to \$50. Your net profit on the deal is \$950.

Counting the entire actual time consumed in the negotiations as 38 hours, including the original 1/2 hour devoted to reading the ads, and finding the chance, you will have earned \$25 an hour.

Business deals paralleling the one cited, many on much larger scales and more or much smaller, are not rare in this city—they are occurring continually. And nine-tenths of them have their origins in what are commonly called the "want ads."
