WEATHER FORECAST.

Washington, Feb. 12.—Forecast for North Carolina for tonight and Tuesday:
—Rain tonight and Tuesday; brisk to high northeast winds.

The atmospheric pressure is still high east of the Mississippi river, but as the high pressure area which dominated the weather the past few days has moved eastward the pressure has fallen and was accompanied by a corresponding rise in temperature. The pressure is low in the southwest and southeast in which regions there have been general rains; in the southeast and in Texas rainy conditions still prevail.

BRYAN'S SPEECH.

Interpretation of It Used to Stir Chinese Against Americans.

Spokane, Wash., Feb. 12.—Samuel Glasgow, manager of a milling company of Spokane and Seattle, says that he has received from William Burt, Chinese representative of the company, newspapers and letters which say that the Chinese interpretation of a speech made by William J. Bryan before Chinese merchants at a dinner given by them in his honor, has been used by Chinese agitators to stir up renewed antipathy to American products.

To Develop 25,000 Horse Power.
It is stated that Messrs. Hugh MacRae & Co., of Wilmington, N. C., have decided to begin in the near future the construction work required in the development of the Bluff Falls water power on the Pee Dee river, 12 miles from Lilesville, N. C. Estimates have placed the possible development at 25,000 horse power, and it is understood that it will require two years to build the required dam. The purpose is, of course, to transmit this power by electricity to the various manufacturing industries in the territory around Lilesville.

Called at Roosevelt's Car With Wife and Babies

Incident at Raleigh on President's Southern Trip Told by the Ladies Home Journal.

The last number of the Ladies Home Journal, in a page article on "Mr. Roosevelt's Trip on His Southern Tour," says that "The companions of President Roosevelt's recent southern tour recall an incident which occurred just outside of Raleigh, N. C., where the train had stopped early in the morning to wait until the party had taken breakfast before they went into the city. As the president stepped out on the rear platform he found a Methodist clergyman, a rather shabby black man, with a frail slender woman, also simply dressed, but who wore an extremely sweet countenance. The husband was carrying two small children while his wife stood behind a baby carriage. They had waited an hour there to see the president. He at once, shaking hands, began to chat with them. The mother said to him in a delightfully simple way as she took the little one out of the vehicle, 'I wanted to show you this dear baby of ours. You have been very happy as president, but you have not been a bit happier than you have been with this baby.'

The president was greatly touched by this incident. He recognized that here were people who were literally having a struggle to rear their children, denying themselves many of the comforts of life and, perhaps, things which would help the husband in his sacred calling. But they were enjoying their struggle in the love of their little ones; they found a delight greater than anything that the ambitions of the world could give. President Roosevelt told his associates on the train that he had more respect for this kind of a woman than for any other type of person in the world, man or woman.

Try Hasty February 20.
An Associated Press dispatch from Gallatin, N. C., last night says:
"George Hasty, of this city, who fatally shot Milan Bennett and George Abbott Davidson, of the 'Nothing But Money' theatrical company here December 15, 1923, will be tried on the charge of murder February 20. Hasty, who has been in jail since the killing, will be defended by local counsel. The prosecution will be conducted by T. B. Several witnesses of the tragedy, members of the theatrical company, will appear on the stand for the State. Trial will be followed with the greatest interest and private homes have offered hospitality to the members of the company who will attend the trial."
