DOUGLASS OLDS DEAD IN STRICT CONFIDENCE.

Passed Away at Southern **Pines This Morning**

Remains Brought to Raleigh-Was Youngest Son of Col. F. A. Olds-Had Been Brought from Texas in Hope That His Health Would Improve There-Funeral Announcement.

Douglass Olds, youngest son of Col. F. A. Olds, died this morning at Southern Pines.

Telegrams to this effect were received from Col. Olds early this morning and brought deep sorrow to a wide circle of friends in this city, and the news will be learned with sincere sympathy

by friends of the family throughout the state. The end came this morning about 1:30 o'clock and Col. Olds and Mr. and Mrs. R. E. L. Bunch were at the young man's bedside.

The remains were brought to Raleigh on the Seaboard Air Line fast train No. 66 which being one hour and a half late, did not arrive here until 1:15 this afternoon. At the depot were numerous friends in waiting to extend their sympatry to the bereaved father and sis-


