Formal Complaint Filed Yesterday Evening In \$50,000 Damage Suit By Mrs. C. A. Norris Against North Carolina Home Insurance Com-

Yesterday evening the complaint in the damage suit brought by Mrs. CAA. Norris, wife of Mr. M. T. Norris, against the North Carolina Home Insurance Company for \$50,000 on account of alleged libel and slander, was filed in the office of the clerk of the superior court. Summons in this suff was issued the other day, as reported in The Evening Times.

The complaint, after recpitulating that Mrs. C. A. Norris has been many years a resident here, that the North Carolina Home Insurance Company is a corporation of the state, that Mrs. C. A. Norris on November 17 and prior owned a tract of 51 acres on the Avents Ferry road, known as the W. H. Norris home tract, upon which was located a twostory frame house which was burned and consumed by fire on the night of November 17, sets forth:

"That at the time of said fire the said building and additions attached were insured in the sum of \$500 and the said insurance at that time was for the benefit of the plaintiff. That on or about the 14th and
