

WEATHER FORECAST.

(By the Associated Press.)
 Washington, July 25.—Forecast for North Carolina for tonight and Thursday:
 Fair tonight and Thursday; light to fresh north to northeast winds.

In general the pressure has risen east of the Mississippi River and the temperature has fallen except along the Lakes and in the Ohio Valley; west of the Mississippi the pressure has fallen with centers of low pressure over the Dakotas and over Arizona. There has been a rise in temperature from the Rockies to the Mississippi River accompanying the fall in pressure. Rain has fallen along the Atlantic and east Gulf coasts, also in Utah, Oklahoma, northern Texas and Nebraska. At Jupiter 2.70 inches of rain fell in 12 hours and the following heavy precipitation occurring during the past 24 hours has been reported: Tampa, Fla., 1.86; Sherman, Tex., 1.82; Weatherford, Okla., 1.72; and North Platte, Neb., 1.34. The weather in this section will be dominated by the high pressure area to the north which will cause fair weather tonight and Thursday in this vicinity.

WITNESS IN LIQUOR CASE PAYS COSTS.

Gladya Webster, a white woman, was before Police Justice Badger today charged with retailing liquor without license and the trial brought about a curious state of affairs.

The warrant had been sworn out upon information given by Ethel Young. The latter declared that she had bought liquor from the defendant and gave the name of a young man who had also bought two half pints from her. However, when the trial came off today the Young woman went on the stand and swore that she had never bought a drop of liquor from Gladys Webster and attempted to explain her previous statement by saying that she was drunk and did not know what she had said.

When this evidence was in Judge Badger promptly turned the Young woman loose and taxed the Webster woman with the costs in both cases, amounting in all to \$7.50.

CHARTERS FOR 3 NEW CORPORATIONS.

The secretary of state issued a charter today for the Southern Live Stock Insurance Company of High Point, capital \$250,000 authorized and \$50,000 subscribed by E. M. Arnfield, G. T. Perry, F. C. Boyles and others.

Another charter was to the Clay Printing Company of Hickory, capital \$25,000 authorized and \$2,000 subscribed by J. W. Clay, J. A. Martin and others to do a general printing business, deal in books, stationery and other branches of business.

The Carolina Improvement Company of Belhaven, Beaufort county, was also chartered, with \$100,000 capital authorized, the subscribers to stock being W. E. Strabbs, W. L. Oden and others; the business proposed being mercantile and real estate.

THEIR BUSINESS IN NORTH CAROLINA.

Commissioner of Insurance J. R. Young said in commenting on the call he has issued for a special meeting of the North Carolina policyholders of the Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York and the New York Life Insurance Company in Raleigh September 12 for agreeing on some cooperation in the matter of the meeting in New York December 18 for the election of directors in these companies, that both have extensive interests in North Carolina. The New York Life has 6,051 policies in force in the state, aggregating \$11,171,497, and the Mutual Life of New York 7,377 policies, amounting to \$15,107,114.

NATIONAL DEPOSIT IN N. C. BANKS.

A Washington despatch states that Secretary of Treasury Shaw has decided to deposit \$12,000,000 among the national banks of the country in addition to the \$15,000,000 previously distributed among the banks. The purpose of this distribution is to counteract any undue contraction of the currency as the result of paying \$20,000,000 into the United States treasury for the Panama canal bonds. In the list of banks given out the National Bank of Fayetteville, N. C., and the City National Bank of Greensboro each receive \$50,000 deposit.

LATE COL. DONELSON GOV. BRANCH'S GRANDSON.

The people of Raleigh read yesterday with regret the news of the death of Col. Samuel Donelson in Washington. He was sergeant-at-arms of the house the four years John G. Carlisle was speaker and at the time of his death was assistant sergeant-at-arms of the democratic national committee. Colonel Donelson was born in Nashville, Tenn. sixty-one years ago. He was a gallant Confederate soldier, serving on the staff of Gen. Forrest. Col. Donelson was the son of Gen. Daniel S. Donelson of the Confederate army, a graduate of West Point. His maternal grandfather was the late Governor Branch of North Carolina, who was secretary of the navy in the cabinet of President Andrew Jackson. Hence the deceased has a number of relatives living in Raleigh. Port Donelson was named in honor of Col. Donelson.
