

WEATHER FORECAST.

(By the Associated Press.) Washington, Aug. 16.—Forecast for North Carolina for tonight and Friday: Fair tonight; local rains Friday; light variable winds.

The pressure is high in the eastern portion of the country, with the center of high pressure over New England; the pressure is also high in the northwest. In the remainder of the country, low pressure prevails, with the lowest readings in the southwest. Light showers fell in the Southern States east of the Mississippi. At Oklahoma 1.20 inch of rain was reported, and light showers occurred at Palestine, El Paso and Kansas City. The skies are partly cloudy in the east and generally clear in the west. During the past 24 hours the temperature changes have been unimportant. The following high maximum temperatures were reported yesterday: 94 degrees at Huron, Salt Lake City, Winnemucca, and San Antonio; 96 degrees at Havre and Shreveport; 98 degrees at Miles City; and 100 degrees at Phoenix. The weather in this vicinity will be fair tonight, and there will probably be rain Friday.

RE-ARREST OF ALLEGED TOOL OF SYNDICATE.

(By the Associated Press.) New York, Aug. 16.—Charles C. Browne, the convicted federal silk examiner who was ordered released from the state's prison at Sing Sing on Tuesday upon a writ of habeas corpus issued by Judge Hough of the United States circuit court, was re-arrested as he stepped from the prison and arraigned before Judge Hough. Bail for his trial upon an indictment yet pending against him was fixed at \$30,000 and he was temporarily committed to the Tombs prison. Judge Hough intimated that the government believed Browne a member of or a tool of a syndicate and he thought the bail should be fixed at a high sum.

THE SUDDEN DEATH OF CAPT. JOHN LINDSAY.

(Special to the Evening Times.) Salisbury, N. C., Aug. 16.—Capt. John Lindsay, a native of Scotland, and one of the best known men in the county, died this morning at his home on South River, nine miles in the country, after an illness of less than a day. He was reading yesterday afternoon when he fell unconscious to the floor, paralysis of the brain being the cause. His age was seventy-five. He came to America fifty-four years ago on an eloping marriage tour. He leaves a wife and four children.
