(By the Associated Press.) York, Aug. 30,-William J. Bryan after spending the night aboard Nixon's houseboat Loundoun, which is anchored off the Ocean Yacht Club pier at Stauleton, S. I. One of the early callers on Mr. Bryan was Mayor Tom L. Johnson of Cleveland. Mr. Bryan will go aboard the Illini again this afternoon for luncheon. At three o'clock the yacht will start for the battery and will land Mr. Bryan KOUSEVEL at 4 p. m.

After Mr. Bryan left the Illini this morning the yacht steamed up the North river to an up-town pier where Mrs. Bryan was landed. She went to the Victoria hotel to await Mr. Bryan's arrival this afternoon.
