critical, but that the persistency with which many American papers have insisted that a revolt in Mexico against foreigners is imminent has created a decided feeling of unrest among the foreigners and excited the common Mexican to thoughts of what might be done along the lines in these publications, and he adds: "If after all this agitation, for nearly all of which the American papers are responsible, there are no local disturbances in the middle of September the fact will speak marvellously well for the Mexican government and people. If there should be any local disturbances they will be handled rightly by the Mexican government. Such a thing as a general uprising is not to be seriously considered."

May Treat Them as Anarchists. Numerous telegrams have been exchanged between the state department and Ambassador Thompson in relation to the publishers of Regeneration, in which the ambassador has suggested that if these men could be dealt with as anarchists, President Diaz would feel a deep gratitude. The suggestion made by Mr. Thompson followed interviews he had with President Diaz in which the latter expressed earnest hope that the United States government could take steps to prevent the further circulation of the paper.

The state department immediately referred the dispatches of Mr. Thompson to the department of justice with a view to ascertaining what measures might be taken against the newspaper Regeneration or its publishers. In that department an investigation is now proceeding, but no information could be had as to what form it is taking.

He said he was until 1 o'clock, and that he had staid in a caboose the rest of the night.

Ellis was taken back to Mr. Moore's store, where Mrs. Ellis identified him, and then to the lock-up. This may be the man who has robbed so many houses lately in the upper part of town.

SWANSON WON'T BE AT BRYAN MEETING.

Richmond, Va., Sept. 7.—Because of the pressure of official business and the imperative demand for the disposition of matters of great importance to the state, Governor Swanson today announced that he would be compelled to decline the invitation to attend the fair at Radford and to preside at the meeting, which is to be addressed by William Jennings Bryan September 15.

CARDINAL DECORATED BY GERMAN EMPEROR.

(By the Associated Press.) Berlin, Sept. 7.—Emperor William has decorated Cardinal Kopp, with the order of the black eagle, the highest Prussian decoration. This is the first time the order has ever been conferred on a Catholic prelate. It is remarked that the relations between the German government and the vatican have grown closer since the church and state situation in France became acute. The headquarters of Cardinal Kopp are at Breslau, where he has steadily used his influence in bettering the relations between the Poles and the Prussian authorities.

KING EDWARD CURED RETURNS TO LONDON.

(By the Associated Press.) Marienbad, Sept. 7.—King Edward today completed the cure and left for London.

(By the Associated Press.) Washington, Sept. 7.—The navy department was informed today of the arrival of the cruiser Boston at the Bremerton navy yard, Washington. She will be docked and later a report will be made as to the injury she sustained by going aground on Peabody Rock in Rosario Straits.

Flames Damage Glue Plant.

(By the Associated Press.) St. Joseph, Mo., Sept. 7.—Fire today damaged Swift & Company's glue factory to the extent of \$50,000. The toy and novelty concern from Atlanta, which occupied one of the stores in the new Stronach building on Wilmington street temporarily, has left the city. The Fight Will Begin in Chicago Monday

Delegates from Metal Trades Organizations to Form an International Federation Which Will Collect Funds to Carry on the Struggle.

(By the Associated Press.) Chicago, Sept. 7.—A fight for an eight hour day which will affect more than 200,000 workers in the various metal industries is to be begun in Chicago next Monday. Delegates from every local organization of metal trades workers in America will meet to form an international federation which will collect funds and carry on the struggle. These organizations do not expect to ask that the change actually take place probably for four years, but a committee will take up the work of securing funds, educating the workers and doing all the preliminary work necessary to prepare the men for the contest if one must come.

REPORTED THAT EARLE MAY HEAD THE CONCERN

(By the Associated Press.) Philadelphia, Pa., Sept. 7.—It was reported on the floor of the stock exchange this afternoon that Receiver Earle has completed the reorganization of the Real Estate Trust Company and that he will become the president of the institution.

Investigations Going Forward.

Three separate investigations of the wrecking of the Real Estate Trust Company of this city are now in progress and it is expected that by the time the examinations have been concluded every irregular transaction and the name of every director, officer, or employee of the institution who may have had a hand in the unlawful proceedings will be known to the investigators. Receiver Earle is hard at work uncovering all securities and other papers to ascertain their value with a view of an early resumption of business by the company. District Attorney Bell with a corps of assistants is pursuing his investigation to learn whether any other persons connected with the institution are criminally liable for the ruining of the institution, and the state of Pennsylvania, through its banking commissioner, John A. Berkey, this afternoon began a thorough examination of the condition of the trust company.

A COURT MARTIAL IS RECOMMENDED.

(By the Associated Press.) Washington, Sept. 7.—Secretary Bonaparte today made public the opinion of the court of inquiry which examined into the circumstances of the collision of the Alabama and Illinois on July 21 off Brenton's Reef. The secretary has taken no action in the case but it is expected he will approve the recommendations for court martial for two officers. The court recommends trial by court martial of Captain Samuel P. Comly, commanding the Alabama and Lieutenant Alfred W. Pressey, officer of the deck of the Alabama, for negligence in suffering a vessel of the United States to be hazarded. Three other officers are mentioned in the opinion, but in each of those it is recommended that no further proceedings be had.

Epidemic Disappeared.

Assistant State Veterinarian G. A. Roberts has returned from Hyde and other eastern counties and says the epidemic of "stagers" (feet poisoning) which made such havoc among horses and mules during the past two months, has completely disappeared. Dr. Tait Butler, state veterinarian, left this afternoon for Asheville on business connected with the agricultural department.
