Control All Small Towns in Santa Clara

AND MENACE THE LARGE

Guerra is Marching Toward Havana and All Government Troops Which Can Be Spared From Points Outside Are Concentrating in the City Where Uneasiness I eigns.

(By the Associated Press.) Havana, Sept. 13 .- The rebellion looms stronger today than ever. The smaller towns in Santa Clara prov ince appear to be absolutely in the control of the insurgents. Cienfue gos is in a state of alarm. Railroad river and steamboat communication has been stopped. The rebels out side of Cienfuegos continue to re ceive reinforcements.

Things are normal at Santa Clara City. Trains over the lines of the United Railroads are running with out interruption, except occasional hold-ups. Both Santa Clara and Cienfuegos are prepared to resist invasion, but the number of rebels before these cities is vastly superior to the government forces. Pino Guerra is marching toward Havana and this coupled with the very much increased concentration of rebels out side the city, is causing uneasiness

Deposits in the banks are extremely heavy, but money is tight. province are being brought into the city proper. Holding Up Trains.

Depredations along the lines of lines are not molested other than to be fired upon by small bands of rebels.

Feliciano Prieto, who has the reputation of being a strike leader, has been arrested. There is reason to believe that the liberals attempted to complicate matters by causing a strike in Havana. Their efforts, however, were futile

The steamer Maria Herrerra, with arms and ammunition aboard for the government, arrived here from New York without incident.

The government's supplies of arms and ammunition are fairly plentiful, but there is little doing in the way of enlistments.
