Rain and warmer tonight: Thursday rain, warmer in east portion; fresh

The high pressure area in the northeast has moved slowly eastward. The barometer is low over the upper lake region and over the gulf. These are causing higher temperatures throughout the northern states east of the mississippi, and rains in the southeastern states. An area of high barometer, with a cool wave, has moved eastward from the extreme northwest and this morning overlies Montana and the Dakotas. Frost is reported from Miles City, Mont., and Bismarck, N. D. The following heavy rains occurred in the Cotton Belt during the past 24 hours: New Orleans, 4.10; Vicksburg, 1.48; Shreveport, 1.12; Brownsville, Tenn., 1.50; Dyersburg, Tenn., 1.60; Brinkley, Ark., 2.26; Forrest City, Ark., 2.52; Newport, Ark., 2.00; Paris, Texas., 1.52; Doan's Ointment cures itching, Monroe, La., 2.02; Brookhaven, Miss., bleeding or protruding piles after low barometer will cause rains and years of suffering.
