WOMEN INVADE NEITHER TEAM CHICAGO SLUMS REACHED GOAL

Exhort Red Light Sirens to Lead Pure Lives

The A. & M. Considers It a Defeat

PREACH IN DANCE HALL VISITORS A SURPRISE

Accompanied by Detectives, Delegates of National Purity Federation Go Through the Seamy Side of Chicago and Use Their Eyes Strenuously.

(By the Associated Press.) Chicago, Oct. 12.—The annual convention of the National Purity Federation which has been holding a three-days' session at Abraham Lincoln Center, a social settlement here, closed last night with an impromptu revival service on the floor of a dance hall in the center of the Twenty-second street livery.

The service was the final act of the most picturesque "stunning tour" denizens of the levee have ever witnessed. At the close of the final meeting of the conference twenty-five of the workers, the majority of them women, took a car for the "red light district," secured the assistance of two detectives and spent two hours wandering from resort to resort, interviewing and exhorting the inmates, inspecting every nook and corner of the establishments, and leaving no stone unturned in the direction of sightseeing.

Among the "evils" condemned in the various resolutions passed at yesterday's session were:

Ultra décolleté.

Exclusion of married women from holding salaried positions in public offices.

Seating in congress of "any man who practices or subscribes to polygamy."

Denial of political citizenship to women.

Any form of state, local or police regulation of vice which may be in any way regarded as a permit.

Every Time A. and M. Would Get Near Richmond's Goal Her Lighter Line Would Hold With Indomitable Spirit—Waite Broke A. and M.'s Line Several Times.

A. and M., 0; Richmond, 0. That was the surprising result of the football game yesterday afternoon on the new athletic field. A. and M. looked upon it as a defeat, because they had counted on having an easy time of it. Coach Heston was disgusted, and said after it was over that the A. and M. boys didn't do any better than they had done the first day of practice this season. It was overconfidence, he said, that was the cause of their undoing; for he, too, seemed to consider it a defeat. He thought his team failed to work together at the critical points.

It was just a question all through the game whether or not A. and M. would score, and three times during the first half and once in the second they came near it, but each time the light but gritty Richmond boys held the heavier line and got the ball on downs. It was a splendid exhibition of the fact that weight is not always a sine qua non in football even when both sides are trained.

Richmond was never near scoring except once when Richardson tried a kick from the field at the thirty-yard line near the close of the game. A. & M. broke through and the kick lacked force enough to carry, and the farmers got the ball on the twelve yard line.

It was a fast, snappy game. The crowd was not so large as at the Randolph-Macdonald game, but it was a good crowd. The new field received a great many compliments, although the stands are not yet set. It is level and free from stones and well drained.

A. & M. was crippled by the loss of Wilson early in the game. He was disqualified by Dr. Royster, the umpire, who ordered him out on the ground that he had kicked a player. Wilson claimed that he had no intention of committing a foul, but that as he was trying to free himself from the man who was tackling him he accidentally struck him with his foot.

Whitehurst was put in when Wilson had to go out.

Many times the forward pass was tried, and sometimes it worked well and was very pretty to look at, but often it resulted in the loss of the ball to the side trying it. A. & M. got very close to Richmond's goal in the second half by means of one of those plays that was beautifully executed.

The visitors won the admiration of all by their splendid pluck and dash and steadiness in critical situations. Altogether, they played fine ball. Waite's punting was a feature. For A. & M., Eskridge, Stevenson, Hardie and Sherford deserve special mention. Again, some weakness was shown on the left. Waite often making holes in that region.

Richmond was particularly fast in getting her plays started, and her men tackled well and did some pretty interference work. The way her line held at critical moments was wonderful.

TO TRANSPORT FRUIT QUICKLY TO THE EAST.

(By the Associated Press.) San Francisco, Cal., Oct. 12.—The Southern Pacific, Texas & Pacific, Missouri, Kansas & Texas jointly have formed the Southern Freight Dispatch Company for the quick transportation of fruit to Kansas City, St. Louis & Chicago, and thence on to New York and the east. The first train of the new company will leave Los Angeles October 15.

The train is to have precedence over all others, except those carrying passengers. The Missouri, Kansas & Texas will try to get the train from Fort Worth to Kansas City, a distance of 596 miles, in twenty hours, which is an average of 25 miles an hour.

HEARST'S LETTER OF ACCEPTANCE.

(By the Associated Press.) Elmira, N. Y., Oct. 12.—William Randolph Hearst's letter accepting the democratic nomination for governor will be sent to State Chairman Corners today. The precise nature of the letter could not be learned today. The meetings up-state at which Mr. Hearst is now speaking are almost invariably arranged and held under joint democratic and independence league auspices and with the co-operation of the democratic state committee.

THE ALASKAN WILDS TAME DESPERADOES.

(By the Associated Press.) Dawson, Alaska, Oct. 12.—Hendrickson and Thornton, the escaped desperadoes of the Tenama district, were captured Tuesday near Nation City, below Eagle, not far from where they escaped last week from the steamer Dayville Young, while en route to Seattle. Both men had wandered several days through the woods without food or shelter and were in such a bad condition that they did not resist the officers. The capture was made by Deputies Gertz and Villeneuve.

THREE THOUSAND BALES DESTROYED.

(By the Associated Press.) Bremen, Germany, Oct. 12.—Three thousand bales of cotton which arrived here from Savannah October 8th on the British steamer Turkistan, were destroyed by fire today.
