"ZAZA" TONIGHT.

"Zaza" is the piece in which Miss Mabel Montgomery will appear at the Academy tonight. In its original French it was the work of Pierre Berton. The English version is more than a fine translation, and proved to be the most artistic hit of Mrs. Leslie Carter's career. It is an adaptation involving much originality, as well as nice discrimination between the tastes of French and American audiences. The woman whom Miss Montgomery is to portray is a singer and dancer in a low concert hall. She fascinates a middle-aged man, whose gentleness of manner in turn wins her heart, and she quits the stage to live with him. After a while she learns that he is a husband, whereupon she goes reverently to expose him to his wife, but she is turned back from vengeance by her lover's little child, and so goes away to lead a better life.

DOROTHY VERNON OF HADDON HALL.

Miss Laura Burt is appearing this season in the title role of the dramatized version of Charles Major's charming novel, "Dorothy Vernon of Haddon Hall." Prior to her engagement with the late Sir Henry Irving, she had established a splendid reputation as an actress of great versatility, some of her best work having been done when playing opposite Madge Lessing in "The Dangerous Maid," produced at the Casino in New York. Miss Burt's splendid skill with the foil helped to make the fencing scene in "The Dangerous Maid" one of the finest ever given on any stage. WEATHER FORECAST.

(By the Associated Press.)
Washington, Oct. 12.—Forecast for North Carolina for tonight and Saturday:
Fair and not so cold tonight and Saturday; light variable winds.

The northeast low has moved eastward, followed by the eastern high pressure area, which has increased in energy and now lies central over West Virginia and has caused a continuation of the abnormally low temperature throughout the region east of the Mississippi river. Temperatures below the freezing point were observed at many stations in North and South Carolina, Georgia and Tennessee, and light to blizzard frost was reported in the eastern belt east of the Mississippi river. The lowest minimum temperatures reported were 22 degrees at Raleigh, N. C.; Charlotte, N. C., and Newnan, Ga.; 21 degrees at New Bern, N. C.; Greenwood, S. C.; 20 degrees at Charlotte, S. C.; 19 degrees at Spartanburg, S. C.; 18 degrees at Lenoir, N. C.; 17 degrees at Weldon, N. C., and 16 degrees at Greensboro, N. C. The pressure is falling over the Mississippi valley westward to the Pacific coast, where it is rising. This fall in pressure is attended by a general rise in temperature. The southern high pressure area will continue to move to the east and the consequent falling barometer will cause fair weather and not so cold in this vicinity tonight and Saturday.
