

SMALL TRADING AT THE OPENING

Stock Dealing Limited and No Big Changes

STRENGTH CAME LATER

Prices Moved Fitfully and Frequently Reversed Their Course During the Second Hour—Reaction Followed Establishment of New High Level—The Quotations.

(By the Associated Press.) New York, Oct. 24.—The first business in stocks was small and at prices little changed from those of last night.

The opening decline did not proceed far before supporting orders began to make their appearance and the market rallied to yesterday's closing level.

Prices again declined to about mid-way between the highest and lowest figures of the first hour.

The market lacked the energy to rise even when there were no stocks pressing for sale.

Prices moved fitfully and frequently reversed their course during the second hour.

A close scrutiny of the list failed to show much alteration in prices after one o'clock.

The market closed dull and weak. There was a convulsive rise of 2 3/8 in Norfolk and Western on the announcement of the increase in dividend to 5 per cent.

PROTEST BY THE TRUCK GROWERS
