"EVERYMAN."

"Everyman," the old morality play which the Ben Greet English players will present at the Academy of Music on Thursday evening, November 15, is acted on a stage to represent the cloister yard of Salamanca Cathedral in Spain where the early passion plays were commonly performed in the XIVth, XV, and XVIIth centuries. It is acted with sacred choral and instrumental music of the XIIIth century and with religious processions.

The first modern performance of "Everyman" was given by the Elizabethan Stage Society of London. It has been acted by the Ben Greet English Players in the principal cities of England, Ireland and Scotland and of the northern states in this country, notably in New York for a period of twenty weeks. It has also been presented by these actors at many of the leading universities, colleges and schools including Oxford, Cambridge and Rugby in England, and Harvard, Yale, Princeton, Wellesley, Vassar, Bryn Mawr, Smith, Dartmouth, the Universities of California, Leland Stanford, Jr., Chicago, Colorado, Nevada, and Washington, and will be presented in this city under the directions of the Baptist University.

ONLY TWO BODIES YET FOUND.

Yadkin Dragged—Death of Mr. D. L. Saylor, Mrs. Wingate, Miss Page.

(Special to The Evening Times.) Salisbury, N. C., Nov. 12.—The Yadkin river was thoroughly dragged yesterday and Saturday for the bodies of the five negroes drowned the night before, but up to the present only two have been recovered. Many Salisbury people went out to watch the work, which is being done almost entirely by the white citizens of the neighborhood. The two found were washed a considerable distance from the point of drowning and it is feared that the remaining three will never be recovered, owing to the swiftness of the stream. There were but three witnesses to the accident and one of these swam to the last of the colored women who sank as he reached for her.

Mrs. Annie Wingate of Spencer, wife of the well known passenger engineer of the Southern, died Saturday morning and was buried from the Baptist church yesterday. Miss Maggie Page, the seventeen year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John H. Page, died the same day.

Mr. D. L. Saylor, aged sixty-six, and formerly a resident of Wadesboro, died yesterday morning at his home in west Salisbury. He was a Confederate veteran and saw service throughout the conflict. He leaves five children, four daughters and one son. He was a grand old man and will be lamented.
