"In the matter of the order discharging the enlisted men of three companies of the Twenty-fifth infantry, assued by the president, applicatelegraphed the president of the application and delayed the proceedings in the discharge until the president could indicate his wishes. The secretary was in the meantime called out of town. No answer was received from the president.
