EDUCATORS IN SESSION

Discuss Recommendations to be Made to Legislature

Committee Present From Teachers' Association and Also Association of County Superintendents—Two Members of Each Committee Absent—Proposed Recommendations in Superintendent Joyner's Report Discussed.

There was a joint meeting last night of the legislative committees from the Teachers' Association and also State Association of County Superintendents to discuss what recommendations should be made to the approaching legislature in regard to educational matters. Those in attendance were J. I. Foust, Greensboro, chairman; R. D. W. Connor, Raleigh, secretary; C. W. Massey, Durham, and E. C. Brooks, Goldsboro; and from the county superintendents, W. H. Ragsdale, Pitt county, chairman; W. S. Long, Alamance, secretary; and B. B. White, Franklin. Two members of each committee were absent, Superintendent J. Y. Joyner, president, and Dr. W. T. Whitsett, president of the North Carolina Teachers' Assembly, was present by invitation.

The proposed recommendations in the forthcoming bi-annual report of State Superintendent Joyner were fully discussed, and also other matters pertaining to the improvement and development of the public schools in North Carolina. Nothing is to be given out just at this time as to what recommendations the committee decided upon.
