THE CASE OF RIGGSBEE CHANGES OF SCHEDULE

It Comes up in Court at Durham Next Week

So Does the Harris Case--Growth of City Shown by Postoffice Figures. Trinity and Southern Conservatory of Music Open.

(Special to The Evening Times.) Durham, N. C., Jan. 3.--Today Trinity College, Trinity Park School and the Southern Conservatory of Music all opened for the new year's work, the first exercises of the day being held at 9 o'clock. There was a large attendance, practically all of the old students with some new ones being back in their places.

Tonight there will be a meeting of Durham Lodge, No. 31, Knights of Pythias, at which meeting the newly elected officers will be installed. The officers to be installed will be: Mr. D. W. Sorrell, chancellor commander; Mr. S. C. Brawley, vice-chancellor; Mr. Charles Alston, prelate; Mr. E. C. Matthews, keeper of records and seals; Mr. E. C. Piper, master of finance; Mr. F. M. Carlton, master of exchequer, and Mr. J. G. Huckleboe, master at arms.

Figures on the receipts of the post-office for the year ending December 31 have been given out. The total receipts of the sales department amounted to \$29,824.93, against \$26,259.29 for the year before. This shows an increase of \$3,565.64 for the year. The money order department also showed a large increase, the volume of business being about \$20,000 for each month.

Preparations are now complete for the holding of the criminal term of court here next week. Judge Justice will preside. Among cases set for trial is that against W. T. Riggsbee, charged with illegal voting. He is also to appear and answer the rule that was recently served on him to show why he should not be attached for contempt of court. Another case of interest will be the murder case against J. B. Harris, the young white man who shot to death Maynard F. Goss in a shoe store here not long ago.

Robert Davis, who a few nights ago was shot and wounded by his friend, George Brown, who mistook him for a burglar, is getting along nicely and is out of danger.

NO INDUSTRIAL CRISIS NEAR.

So Declares George Gould, Spelling at Fish's Prognostication of Evil.

(By the Associated Press.) Pittsburg, Pa., Jan. 3.--George J. Gould, head of the Gould system of railroads, which includes the Wabash and the Missouri Pacific, arrived in this city early this morning. He had read the statement of Stuyvesant Fish, formerly president of the Illinois Central road, that an industrial crisis is at hand, and smiled as he said:

"The business conditions of the country look very encouraging, and the immense volume of business done by the railroads during 1906 will not only be equalled, in my judgment, but surpassed, during the present year."

The fact that the statement is made by Mr. Fish that the New York stock exchange is no longer a free market, but the playing of cliques and pools, and that Europe distrusts our financial methods, was given very little concern or thought by the railroad magnate. He said the financial institutions and industrial conditions are in better shape at the present time than at any period in American history.

"There is no industrial crisis imminent," Mr. Gould concluded, "and while the market has declined recently, it is a temporary but healthful reaction."

EIGHT SMALL BOYS IN POLICE COURT.

It was impossible to prove which ones had done the cursing, and all the justice could do was to deliver a severe lecture to the boys. Two white drunks and one negro had to pay \$2.25 each.

Southern Makes Announcement as to Several Trains

Will Become Effective on January 9. Palm Limited Will Go On Then. Train From Keyville Will Arrive One Hour Earlier--Change in Greensboro Train.

The Southern Railway has announced several changes in schedules which become effective on the sixth of January, Sunday. The schedules of the trains out of Raleigh are not affected to any material extent, although there are several small changes in the time of the arrival and departure. The most important changes are on the main line. In nearly every instance the trains are given more time than formerly.

Westbound train No. 135, which at the present time leaves at 3:30 in the afternoon, will leave at 2:50 after the sixth, and arrive at Greensboro at 5:55 instead of 6:35. Westbound morning train No. 107, will leave at 8:05 instead of 8:45, and the same train from Goldsboro will leave at 7:15 in the morning and reach Raleigh at 10:20, instead of leaving Greensboro at 7:50 and arrive here at 10:30. No. 113 from Keyville will arrive at 7:05, instead of 8:05 p. m.

The Florida train of the Southern, which is known as the Palm Limited, will go on Sunday and will run from New York to St. Augustine, Florida. This is a solid vestibule train and is put on each year at this time for the purpose of accommodating the tourist travel to the Land of the Flowers. The train leaves Washington at 6:15 in the evening.

No. 29, one of the main line trains on the Southern which has heretofore left Washington at 10:51, will leave at 11:15 a. m. after next Sunday, arriving at Greensboro about 7 o'clock and will reach Charlotte at 11:25 instead of 9:45 p. m. No. 33 will leave Washington at 9:50 p. m. and arrive at Charlotte at 10:10 a. m., instead of 8:30. The time allowed this train from Washington to Charlotte is one hour and forty minutes longer than the former schedule. It is understood that there will be several other changes but they have not yet been given out.

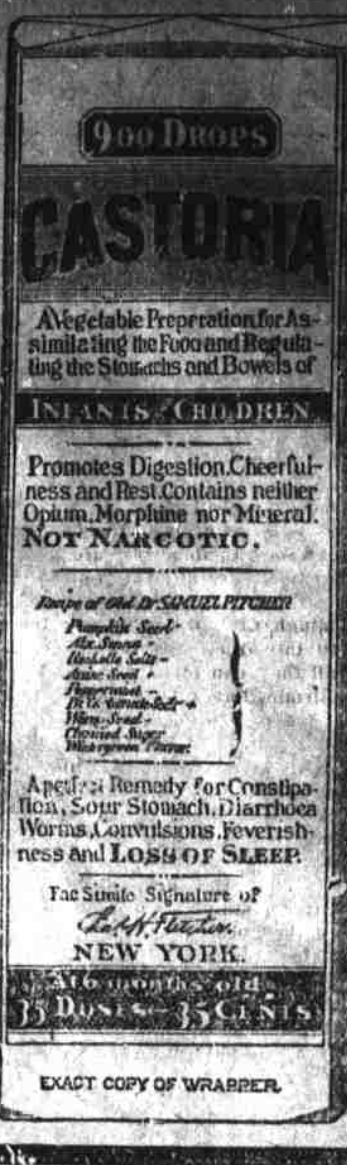
