

DETAILED STORY OF FIRE AT NEWBERRY

A special from Columbia, S. C., gives the following details of the fire at Newberry yesterday.

Fire at Newberry, a thriving little city of 6,000 population, yesterday destroyed 22 residences, 10 stores and two churches, entailing a loss estimated at between \$150,000 and \$200,000, with insurance of about \$85,000.

Surrounded on all sides by the flames was the residence of Mrs. J. B. Humbert, a widow of a former Methodist minister, which was never touched, although the heat from the flames scorched the house several times.

It is related that Mrs. Humbert, during the entire time of the conflagration, prayed that her home might be spared, and the way that her prayer was answered in the subject of discussion.

Policeman T. G. Williams rescued two old ladies who had been almost overcome by heat. The officer himself had a narrow escape by falling debris.

A check in the water supply for ten or fifteen minutes caused much alarm, but the defect was soon remedied.

Among the most prominent buildings destroyed were the residences of O. L. Schumpert and Henry Kinard, two of the handsomest in the city; also the Presbyterian parsonage, occupied by Rev. J. L. Williamson. The large residence of James F. Todd, was also destroyed, together with E. H. Leelle's residence, both on the same block.

Avdleigh Presbyterian church, a handsome wooden building, is a total loss, as is the old Associate Reformed Presbyterian Church, which would have been torn down shortly to be replaced by a handsomer one.

RICHARD CROKER IS SERIOUSLY ILL

THE GOVERNMENT CLOSES IN OIL CASE

(By Leased Wire to The Times.) Chicago, Ill., March 30.—The government has closed its case in the prosecution of the Standard Oil Company and at the request of the defense court has been adjourned until Monday morning.

Arguments on the motion instructing the jury to bring in a verdict for the defendant based on the plea that the government has not proved its case will begin on Monday. It is expected these will last several days.

That the defense has been preparing for this supreme test is well known, and it is the general impression that Virgil P. Kline of Cleveland, general counsel for the Standard Oil Company, will take active charge. Colonel Kline attended the trial for the first two weeks and was present when the arguments on posting and publication were made. It was he who closed those arguments when he became convinced Judge Landis did not view them in a favorable light, and he left immediately for Cleveland, where he has been engaged in framing up a new attack on the government's case.
